FAILURE TO HEED THAT INNER VOICE

I had been an MSF Safety Instructor for several years in another state. I was good enough to rise to the level of teaching other instructors the course materials and critiquing their teachings skills. I became an instructor because I had re-entered motorcycle riding in my mid 40's and took the Beginning Ride Course to enhance what I thought I knew. The course was so good, so well laid out and so easy to master, that I wanted to teach it and at the same time keep my own skills sharp. I knew at that point in my life that I was already succumbing to the aging process...tri-focals, decreasing strength and slowed reaction times. This is by way of introduction to what I say below.

One of the key teachings with that beginning course, the Experienced Rider Course and now the Advanced Rider Course is that one must make a conscious decision every time one rides to ride within one's skills and within the capability of the motorcycle. I have always been a big proponent of the concept. I failed that the other day.

Two weeks ago I was invited to take my Yamaha Super 'T' dual purpose bike on a ride off road with a couple of friends. I had seen the proposed route on a map and knew that it was a combination of asphalt and gravel... allegedly graded and graveled roads. The day before, I began to wonder whether I really wanted to go and massaged that thought until it was too late to back out. Part of me said, 'it's no big deal' and part of me asked, 'am I up to it'.

The next morning was perfect. You may recall that throughout Montana, April 19th was the best of the fresh riding days...warm and sunny without much wind. We began on asphalt up from the Bitterroot Valley on 93, through Missoula and headed for Ravalli where we turned west on Hwy 200. At the junction bridge whose road becomes Hwy 382 towards Hot Springs, we turned north and immediately turned right unto Race Horse Gulch Road. Initially it was an okay road, graveled and level. Gradually it became rutted, steep and unpredictable, however. Thoughts of dumping the bike began to swirl in my head and sure enough, on a downhill stretch where the ruts were very deep, snow was evident and the center line on the road was clay slick, I dumped it. No problem, I'm an ATGATT kind of rider and with a little help I was back aboard the bike. The conditions on the road hadn't changed much and I made a beginning dirt rider's mistake. I rode the high center with 4 fingers covering the brake. Without much warning, the front wheel slid into the left rut, hit loose rock (not gravel) and I reacted by over braking and rolling throttle all at once. Down I went. It wasn't until I rose to help right the bike that I realized I had severely damaged my right foot. There was no remounting and riding it out, plus I now was sure I wasn't going to be able to ride down more of the same.

At that point we were nowhere in cell phone range and we still had miles to go to get down off the mountain. The three of us decided to send someone forward to see how far it was to get to level graded road again. That done, we elected to have me double up with another rider and the third rider ride my bike to the flat road ahead. We picked our way down, dumping the two of us at least once after which we finally reached graded farm roads. I was helped off the bike and left with water and snacks while the other two went back up the mountain to retrieve the third bike. On the way down, my friend dumped his bike again in the very same spot (target fixation, I'm sure).

Sitting on the ground, drinking water and chewing one those awful high protein snacks, I made a decision. In

future, I was going to pay way more attention to that small voice that bubbles up about a ride where I am uncomfortable with the conditions and whether I and the bike will be within our combined capabilities. We weren't that that day.

The long and short of this story is this: heed that small voice! Be realistic about your skills and the capabilities of your motorcycle. Decline rides that you know are out of your range of skill and comfort.

The Doctor says I may be riding again by early July. Fortunately I only fractured a couple of heel bones.

ALL DAY DO IT YOURSELF BASIC MAINTENANCE TECH SESSION

Saturday, May 17th,

@ The Huddy's Outpost, near Helena: Get your motorcycle ready for a summer of riding by performing the basic maintenance in a well equipped shop and with the help of other experienced riders. The shop includes a lift, air compressor, tire changer, carb/throttle body synching meters, GS911 code reader and an assortment of common tools. You provide the tires, oil, filters, plugs and other consumables. If you are having the tires shipped you can have them shipped directly to the Huddy's or bring them with you (they will fit on the back of a bike). Old tires can be left for disposal for a fee of \$1 per tire (that's what the landfill charges). Disposal of old oil and filters is free. If you are new to working on your bike there will be others there to assist; including changing tires. Starts at 10 AM and runs until whenever on Saturday, 17 March. The Huddys have bunks and other places to sleep or camp for those that would like to arrive Friday evening and/or stay Saturday night and then ride to Phillipsburg on Sunday, 18 May. There will be a BBQ on Saturday afternoon and other sustenance for those who are arriving early or staying longer. BYOB. The Outpost is located approximately seven miles west of I15 or approximately 23 miles east of Flesher Pass just off of Lincoln Road at 6750 Silver Fox Court.
