Greetings from the new "Montana Summer Normal"....smoke! Everywhere I've been in the

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last couple of weeks you might as well have been riding in Kansas for all you could see! The trips included Lewistown, Flathead Lake, Plains and on Friday to the Lochsa....the latter a ride to escape the smoke!!! NOT! Our favorite breakfast/lunch destination is an "Incident Command Post" for one of the fires in the area. Parking lot, camping area full of fire engines, firefighters....and smoke so thick that all the entrees are coming "smoked". Anyway, the last couple of weeks of heat and smoke have certainly put a damper on my 2015 mileage! Hope you're having more success (or maybe are just tougher!?) Anyway, we have about a month and a half left on our "official" riding season, so in spite of the fires that keep burning keep the tires turning! Those of you who subscribe to the BMWMOA monthly magazine will get our final mileage reporting form in the October issue. You can send me a copy of our final form. Those of you who sent me something else (letter, email, napkin) can respond in kind. I'll have another reminder in the October issue. (Ed. Riding in the thick smoke represents a significant visual hazard. It's hard to see potential hazards and certainly it makes you a lot less visible to the folks in the vehicles. Ride with your headlight on high beam, and if you have auxiliary driving lights, now would be a great time to use them! I know this sounds like your mother talking, but it would also be a great time to SLOW DOWN!. As with any situation where you have reduced visibility, slowing down accomplishes three vital things, 1) it gives you slower closing rates and in doing so 2) provides you with more time to react and finally 3) it takes less distance to come to a stop if you need to do so.

#### SUMMER RIDING STORY

One of my favorite things to do at motorcycle rallies is to wander through the camping area checking out all the different bikes that show up. Of course there are the new, modern, high tech machines, but what is most interesting are the classic and vintage bikes that people ride, sometimes from great distances. There was no shortage of these bikes at the Billings rally. Most of the old bikes had been well caredfor, but some looked as though they were lucky if they ever got an oil change. Great to know folks are still out on the road with those bikes.

I had to get back to Helena on Saturday so left the rally early that morning and headed toward the Beartooth Pass. The weather was looking good and the ride to Red Lodge was pleasant in the cool morning air. Gassed up with the Harley riders, cleaned the face shield, and headed up the pass. The ride to the top was rather slow as there was a good deal of traffic. At the top, I stopped to take in the view and look at the motorcycles parked there. One of the more interesting bikes was a good condition blue 1977 R75/7 with Krauser hard cases. The rider of this bike looked like he hadn't changed his gear

since the 1970s – open-face helmet, goggles, and well-worn leather clothes. Good for him, I thought, that he can have a nice nostalgic day out on his old bike.

I was hoping to have a rather fast ride down into Cooke City so after no vehicles had gone in about 10 minutes I decided it was time to go. The first few switchback turns are pretty sharp so I rode easy until the radius of the curves began to increase and then started to ride with more confidence and increased speed. Approaching a sharp right hand turn I was concentrating on braking and setting up for the turn when I was startled to see another bike

right on my tail. Must be that \$1000RR I saw at the top. Coming out of the turn the rider went by me like I was standing still. What the heck? It was the old guy on the R75. Before I knew it, he was 200 feet ahead of me and increasing the gap. Well, of course the hormones kicked in (as they do sometimes) and I used the 170+ horse power to quickly catch-up.

I followed him for the next 20 miles or so I got quite the lesson. This guy would barely touch the brakes as the turns approached, and then would accelerate so fast out of the turns that he'd be 100 feet ahead of me going down the straights. I couldn't believe someone could ride that old suspension and those skinny tires so fast in the corners. And he barely shifted his center of mass to the inside of each turn. He was so sure in his technique that he never had to "hang-off" the side of his bike. He was rock solid through all those turns while I struggled to stay on his line.

After about 45 minutes of very spirited cornering he signaled and turn off into a campground. My wave was one of gratitude for the riding lesson as well as goodbye. Later, while enjoying a sandwich in sunny Cooke City it occurred to me that no amount of high tech gadgetry on our modern bikes can substitute for riding experience and knowing exactly how your bike will perform at any given time. The Beartooth Pass is a great highway to ride, especially when you can follow a great rider like that. From now on I am going to look for the old(er) guys to follow.
