Goar Maintenance

Beings how most of us are reading and not riding this month, I wanted to follow up last month's article on gear by talking about riding gloves.

From observation, most of you I've seen have some brand of dedicated riding gloves (as opposed to leather work gloves) and most of them are leather. I also know from having been through a number of different brands of riding gloves, I've finally found a really great pair that fit, are comfortable and are specifically designed for riding.

Gloves range in cost from not so much to "you've got to be kidding me!". I'm here to tell you, that if they are made of leather, you'll extend the life of your gloves immensely by

doing the following steps: 1) clean your gloves thoroughly with saddle soap. The easiest way I've found to do that is put them on, apply saddle soap liberally and then massage the saddle soap into the gloves by using the same motion as you would when you wash your hands. Once you've done that, wipe the gloves with a clean rag, again if you keep them on,

it's easier. 2) Apply a good brand of leather oil (Tanners brand, for example) to your gloves. I find that if I put my gloves on, apply the leather oil and then work it in by using the "hand washing motion", I get good coverage of all the surfaces without creating an extraordinary mess. Once the oil has been applied, simply let it soak in. If you have an excess, wipe it off with a clean rag. This two step process will restore the flexibility and suppleness to your gloves, clean the grime and bugs off and apply a preserving oil which will extend the glove's life. By the way, as part of this process, be sure to check all the stitching, seams, elastic, etc. and make sure that it hasn't or isn't in the process of suffering a failure which would compromise your gloves in the case of a get off.

This is a great winter project which can be done while watch-

ing a movie and one that will have your gloves ready for the first day of riding. (As winter currently stands, that could be awhile!!)
