GET READY FOR CAFÉ 2 CAFÉ 2017!!!!

Yes, Café 2 Café (C2C) is back for 2017. The purpose of C2C remains to ride your motorcycle, travel through our wonderful state and region, spend time with friends and, of course, Good Eats! And it is FREE.

There are some changes in how we will conduct C2C in 2017. The significant changes are:

Participants will place themselves into one of two categories; the **Retired** category or **Worker** category. The Retired category is intended for those who are not employed, all others are Workers. Participants will selfselect the category in which they will compete. Both categories will have a first, second and third place award based on the number of cafes visited. In addition, there will be a Grand Prize for the person(s) who has the greatest number of cafes visited regardless of the category in which he/she competed.

Optional Café 2 Café t-shirts will be available for purchase by participants. Cost of the t-shirt is \$15 and is not required to participate.

Dates of the event are 1 April – 31 October 2017

The list of cafes was expanded and now includes: One in Utah, One in South Dakota, three in Idaho, one in Wyoming, and two in Canada, including one in British Columbia. And a special event will be the Four Corners Challenge that requires a rider to visit four cafes that are spread across the four corners of Montana.

The 2017 C2C Guidelines and Café list will be published soon. The guidelines will describe how to register, order a t shirt and the rules for participating. In the next several days you can expect an email from President Chuck that will provide both documents, and our Internet Techno Giant, Mike Wright, will also have them available on our club web site.

One of the first things he did upon arrival was look for a motorcycle shop. As luck, fate, whatever other forces were in play, he pulled into Slacks Cycle ... Rob and I were out front talking... I had just arrived home on leave from the Navy. For several summers, I would come home and go up to Benchmark and stay in Rob's cabin for two weeks of trail riding with my three sons.

Jerry was looking for a place to ride. Since his trailer had 1 road bike and 3 tail bikes, it looked like he was ready. Rob volunteered me to be a trail guide.... that was 45 years ago.

I still remember that Jerry showed me more ways to fall off a trail bike in two days than I had seen in my (at that time) 18 years of motorcycling... never a dull moment.

In 1976, I retired from the Navy and moved back home to Cascade. We hunted, fished, rode motorcycles, and sank canoe's in the Missouri River together. He moved to Missoula, but returned for hunting season each fall for many years.

When Carolyn and Jerry were married, I was honored to be his best man.

I am sure that his friends west of the mountains learned to expect the unexpected, be patient and be ready for a good laugh... Jerry brought some of each to every encounter. He was a friend in the truest form.

I met Jerry in 2004 as part of the Retreads group. I was a Kawasaki rider...didn't know about the BMW club...yet. Anywhere we stopped or ate, Jerry was always the loudest voice in the group. I guess he got that from selling pharmaceuticals to deaf Doctors.

He and I often rode to Lochsa Lodge although in later years I was never sure he would finish the ride...something I think a lot of his fellow riders were aware of. He always remarked about the beauty of Montana and often would stop, get off his motorcycle and just stare at whatever he found worth observing. Sometimes we would stop and wait for him, other times not. It got so that we didn't worry about him...He always ended up back home.

He and I planned a 5 day trip to Canada one year. He was riding that Burgman Scooter. I picked him up at his house... he was togged out, rain gear on and a water proof roll bag strapped to the back. It was one of those misty, not quite rainy days and as we made our way towards the border, it got a little wetter. We stopped in St. Mary's for gas and he fell into a conversation with a UPS driver. We gassed up and headed towards the Port of Chief Mountain crossing on route 17. That little road out of St. Mary's is not the best maintained road and between the almost rain and the chuck holes, it was an energy sapping ride. At the border, Jerry stopped in the parking lot on the US side and waved me over. He told me he was turning around and going home. I said, "Why"? He said that the UPS driver had told him that Banff was knee deep in snow. I argued with him that we had prepaid nonrefundable reservations and at least we should go on to the first stop in Pincher Creek. Nope. He was going to head home and was I coming with him. When I said, "No", he was clearly disappointed. The border guard had watched this from afar and as I paddled to a stop he said, "Your friend not coming with you?" I told him the story and he laughed. He said he had access to Canadian weather reports and said..." It'll be clear and sunny your whole trip". And it was. But that was Jerry... caring and careful but always unpredictable. I think he discovered on that ride that the Burgman was not a long-distance touring rig. As Chuck said earlier, he was a fan of Canada and I sometimes wonder whether he ever really went there.
