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2017 MILEAGE CONTEST

If you are going to participate in our local Montana BMW Riders Mileage Contest, the start and ending dates will be the same, however the rules are different as follows: You can ride any brand(s) of motorcycle in our contest and you may submit your beginning and ending mileage via snail mail, email, napkin, photo of the speedo, or a copy of your official BMWMOA mileage contest form. In addition to your name, I need the year, make and model of your motorcycle(s) and it's beginning mileage as of **April 8.**

In order to be an "official entrant" in our local contest, I must have your beginning mileage NLT May 8, 2017 and you must submit your ending mileage NLT November 8, 2017. GET READY FOR CAFÉ 2 CAFÉ 2017!!!! 2ND NOTICE

Yes, Café 2 Café (C2C) is back for 2017. The purpose of C2C remains to ride your motorcycle, travel through our wonderful state and region, spend time with friends and, of course, Good Eats! And it is FREE.

There are some changes in how we will conduct C2C in 2017. The significant changes are:

Participants will place themselves into one of two categories; the **Retired** category or **Worker** category. The Retired category is intended for those who are not employed, all others are Workers. Participants will self-select the category in which they will compete. Both categories will have a first, second and third place award based on the number of cafes visited. In addition, there will be a Grand Prize for the person(s) who has the greatest number of cafes visited regardless of the category in which he/she competed.

Optional Café 2 Café t-shirts will be available for purchase by participants. Cost of the t-shirt is \$15 and is not required to participate.

Dates of the event are 1 April – 31 October 2017

The list of cafes was expanded and now includes: One in Utah, One in South Dakota, three in Idaho, one in Wyoming, and two in Canada, including one in British Columbia. And a special event will be the Four Corners Challenge that requires a rider to visit four cafes that are spread across the four corners of Montana.

The 2017 C2C Guidelines and Café list will be published soon. The guidelines will describe how to register, order a t -shirt and the rules for participating. In the next several days you can expect an email from President Chuck that will provide both documents, and our Internet Techno Giant, Mike Wright, will also have them available on our club web site.

SAFETY CORNER

Couch potatoes' arise!! In the last week enough snow has melted that I can see some brown grass appearing on my lawn and the street with tons of gravel has begun to appear. It would appear that maybe....just maybe.....spring may be sorta in sight. That being said, and using myself as the example, I've spent the last 5 months thinking about riding and my physical exercise has been confined to the gym with some "aerobic snow shoveling" thrown in for good measure. As I have read the various moto-mags I get, they have spent the winter talking about both the mental and physical aspects of riding. While I never diminish the need for highly developed physical riding skills, I can tell you that once you've mastered the basic physical skills enough to survive on the street, long term riding is 90% mental, 10% physical. Again using myself as an example, having not ridden for the past 5 months, both of these aspects are in need of some serious attention before beginning the riding season. I would like to point you toward a couple of arti-

cles available on the internet: The first, "Introductory strength training for motorcyclists" found at https:// rideapart.com'articles'introductory-strength-trainingmotorcyclists; will give you some great practical info and video on basic strength training exercises that will help you get in shape for this riding season. A second, "Mental motorcycle riding preparedness- training your brain for danger" found at www.motoress.com/ride/ mental-motorcycle-riding-preparedness; will give you some insight into the mental side of riding. (Don't panic, this sight is a women's riding site, but is a good article!) If you're so inclined, I know you can scour the internet for additional articles....but the point of my article is to get you to start preparing, both mentally and physically for the upcoming riding season before you swing a leg over the bike!!

TRAVELING LIGHT

Touring motorcyclists can learn a lot from the traveling light strategies employed by backpackers. When a hiker has to carry everything he or she will need for several days, every ounce of gear and clothing carried becomes important. Because necessity is often the mother of invention, backpackers take only what they absolutely will need and each item usually has more than just one use.

For touring motorcyclists, however, traveling light is often more about bulk than weight. The goal of taking only those things you will need, however, still holds true for us two-wheeled adventurers. During a recent three-day tour on a café racer-type of bike, I was able to carry everything I needed in a small backpack and tankbag. It would have been nice to have more storage space, but I, indeed, did have everything I needed. This included a digital camera and an iPad for downloading photos.

Here's my list of thirteen essential items for motorcycle touring, including clothing items worn on the first day of travel:

- Protective motorcycle riding gear: full face helmet, boots, gloves, jacket, sunglasses and pants (perforated jacket and pants in summer) If room permits, I also throw in a pair of casual shoes.
- A hydration pack (for use in both warm and cool weather) and power bars, in case food stops become scarce.
- Rain gear, which provides additional warmth if the weather turns cold.
- Small digital camera and batteries or charger.
- Smart phone (and charger) for monitoring weather and calling for help, if needed.
- Critical personal information: name, next of kin phone number(s), medications, drug allergies, blood type, etc.
- Maps and/or GPS device (I usually take both).
- Fresh underwear and socks for each day of the tour.
- One pair of bicycle-type shorts for riding comfort, which are aired-out or rinsed each night, as necessary.
- Two form-fitting synthetic shirts, which are rinsed and air -dried each night (like those sold under the UnderArmor brand, which hold perspiration close to the body and provide an evaporative cooling effect).
- A light weight long-sleeve turtleneck for cold mornings and whenever additional insulation is needed.
- A minimal toiletry kit, which includes any daily medications

A polo type shirt and a pair of jeans for casual wear after the day's ride is complete.

OK, I've probably forgotten something or maybe you have a completely different list of essential items. Anyway, let us know what's on your list of "must have" motorcycle touring items.
