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

In a series of back and forth e-mails between our esteemed President and the President of the Beehive Beemers club in Salt Lake City, we have been receiving fun info about what rides and eateries we might be interested in when and if you go to the BMWMOA rally in Salt Lake City on July 13-16.

The information is fairly extensive so we suggest you save this newsletter, the last one and the next one for the continuing series on rides and eateries. The information is from Jeff Thurmond, who is the President of the Beehive Beemers.

### Day Rides

**Utah Lake, Goshen Pass & Nebo Loop**: Start by heading south on Redwood Road, 1700 W, RT 68, which will take you on the west side of Utah Lake. When you come to the stop sign in Elberta, turn left onto US 6 heading east. In Goshen, turn right onto Center Street heading south to Goshen Pass. This will bring you to Mona where you will pick up RT 91 heading south to Nephi. In Nephi you will turn left onto 100 N Street, RT 132 heading east. Go under I-15 and in a few miles you come to Salt Creek Canyon Road, a/k/a Nebo Loop, on north side of road. Turn left onto Salt Creek Canyon Road heading north. This will end at 600 E in Payson. Continue on 600 E until you come to 100 N in Payson and turn right onto 100 N which becomes State Road taking you to Spanish Fork. From here head north on I-15 back to SLC.

**East side of Utah Lake**: Start by heading south on Redwood Road, 1700 W, RT 68 heading south. You will ride on the west side of Utah Lake. In Elberta, a number of miles south of Utah Lake, turn left onto US 6 heading east. Past the town of Goshen you will see on the north side of the road, the exit for Genola, heading north. Depending on the road to Genola you exited on you will either turn right or left to get to Main Street for Genola. On Main Street head due north which will become Lake Road as it winds around the east side of Utah Lake. This will eventually become 6400 S and when the road T's, turn right onto 4800 S and then right back onto 6400 S heading east. Go right onto RT 77, 3200 W and follow this road to I-15.

**Eureka Canyon, Nephi & Mt. Pleasant**: Start by heading south on Redwood Road, 1700 W, RT 68 heading south. A few miles south of Utah Lake, in Elberta turn right at stop sign heading west on US 6 toward Eureka. In Lynndyl pick up RT 132 heading east to Nephi. In Nephi stay on RT 132 heading east to Moroni where you will take a right onto RT 116 to Mt. Pleasant. In Mt. Pleasant you pick up US 89 heading north then turn left onto US 6 to Spanish Fork. I-15 is your best bet to get back to SLC.

Wolf Creek Pass, Indian Canyon & Huntington Canyon: Start by heading east so you get on I-80 toward Park City. Exit I-80 onto US 40 heading south. Exit US 40 onto RT 248 heading east to Kamas. In Kamas turn right onto RT 32 heading south to Francis. At the stop in Francis, turn left onto RT 35, Wolf Creek Pass Road. Stay on this road over Wolf Creek Pass. You may want to stop in Hanna for coffee and/or food; only café in town, on south side of road. Continue on RT 35 until it dead-ends with RT 87. Turn right onto RT 87 heading south to Duchesne. Coffee at Cowan's Café and buy gas before leaving town. Pick up RT 191 in Duchesne heading southwest through Indian Canyon to Helper and Price. If hungry, exit into Helper, an old RR town that is partially restored. Just outside of Price pick up RT 10 heading south to Huntington. Buy fuel here. In Huntington pick up RT 31 heading northwest on Huntington Canyon Road to Fairview. In Fairview pick up US 89 heading north, then turn left onto US 6 when US 89 intersects. Ride US 6/89 into Spanish Fork and then I-15 north back to Salt Lake City.

Wolf Creek Pass, Daniels Summit and Provo Canyon: Start by heading east so you get on I-80 toward Park City. Exit I -80 onto US 40 heading south. Exit US 40 onto RT 248 heading east. In just a couple of miles, look on left for many new townhouses and RT 2686 Browns Canyon Road. Turn left onto Browns Canyon. When road dead-ends, turn right onto RT 32 heading south. Ride through Peoa and Oakley to Kamas and continue on RT 32 to Francis. At the stop in Francis, turn left onto RT 35, Wolf Creek Pass Road. Stay on this road over Wolf Creek Pass. You may want to stop in Hanna at Hanna Café for coffee or food; south side of road. Continue on RT 35 until it dead-ends with RT 87. Turn right onto RT 87 heading south to Duchesne. Buy gas here. Pick up US 40 heading west. You can stop at Daniels Summit lodge for coffee or a nice lunch-only lodge on top of summit, on south side of road. Continue on US 40 to Heber City. In Heber City turn left at stoplight as you come into town onto RT 189, Provo Canyon Road, heading southwest to Orem. As you come out of the canyon before you get to Orem, turn right at stoplight onto RT 52, also called 800 N, and head west until you get to I-15. Pick up I-15 back to Salt Lake City.

### Mirror Lake Hwy, Evanston WY, Monte Cristo Pass, Trappers Loop, Snow Basin Ski Resort & East Can-

**yon**: Start by heading east so you get on I-80 toward Park City. Exit I-80 onto US 40 heading south. Exit US 40 onto RT 248 heading east to Kamas. At stoplight in Kamas, turn left onto RT 32 heading north. Good place for breakfast here is the Mirror Lake Diner on east side of road. Turn right in 2 blocks onto RT 150, Mirror Lake Hwy, heading east. In quite a few miles, you may want to stop at Provo Falls – on left side of road – and after you pass the summit, 10,687 ft, you may want to exit to take a walk around Mirror Lake – on right side of road. RT 150 will take you into Evanston and become Front Street heading northwest. Buy gas in Evanston before leaving. There are a number of good restaurants in Evanston for lunch. Evanston is

an old rail road town and the restored RR yards and Round House on far northwest end of Front Street are worth the stop. To head back to SLC, depending on how long you took to ride to here, you can either pick up I-80 back to Salt Lake City, or continue your day ride. To continue the ride on two-lane roads, as you come into Evanston on RT 150, Front Street, in downtown Evanston at stoplight intersection of Front Street and US 89, turn onto US 89 heading northeast. When you cross the state line into Utah this becomes RT 16 to Woodruff. In Woodruff, turn left onto RT 39, Monte Cristo Pass Road, heading west to Huntsville. In Huntsville at stop sign turn left staying on RT 39. Go past the major part of town, look for Chris's Café on your left. Just past Chris's Café, turn left onto RT 167, Trappers Loop Road heading south to Mountain Green. At summit of Trappers Loop you may want to take RT 226 to Snow Basin Ski Resort for a look around. Get back on Trappers Loop Road and continue south. At bottom of Trappers Loop Rodd at the stop sign, you can either turn right onto RT 167 heading west, and pick up I-84 and then I-15 back to Salt Lake City. A more scenic and fun road is to turn left onto RT 167, Old Highway Rd to Morgan. In Morgan, pick up RT 66 heading south. This will take you to East Canyon Reservoir. After you go around the reservoir, turn right onto RT 65, East Canyon Road. Pick up I-80 back to Salt Lake City.

East Canyon, Trappers Loop, Monte Cristo Pass &

Mirror Lake Hwy: Start by heading east so you are on I-80 toward Park City. Exit I-80 at exit 134, turning left at stop sign onto RT 65. Follow this over East Canyon to East Canyon Reservoir and at Y turn left onto RT 66 and go around reservoir to Morgan. In Morgan pick up I-84 heading northwest. Exit at exit 96 and turn left onto Old Highway Road to Mountain Green. In Mountain Green, turn right onto RT 167, Trappers Loop Road to Huntsville. At stop sign at bottom of Trappers Loop, turn right onto RT 39 heading east. Watch for right hand turn at 100 S to stay on RT 39 to Woodruff. In Woodruff at stop sign, turn right onto RT 16 to Evanston. Buy fuel in Evanston. Pick up either I-80 back to Salt Lake City, or if more scenic road is desired, pick up RT 150, Mirror Lake Hwy to Kamas. In Kamas at stoplight, turn left onto Main Street, RT 32, then right at next stoplight onto RT 248. Pick up US 40 heading north then I-80 back to Salt Lake City.

East Canyon, Echo, Wanship, Midway & Provo Canyon with option for Sundance and Alpine Loop: Start by heading east so you are on I-80 toward Park City. Exit I-80 at exit 134 turning left onto RT 65 toward East Canyon. Stay on RT 65 to Henefer; do not turn left at Y by East Canyon Reservoir. In Henefer go under I-84 and then turn right onto RT 86, Echo Road heading east. Turn right and go under I-80 staying on Echo Dam Road toward Echo Reservoir and Coalville. Stay on this road through Wanship, where road becomes RT 32 heading south to Rockport Reservoir. Continue on RT 32 through Peoa and Kamas. In Francis, at stop turn right staying on RT 32 heading west. You will ride past Jordanelle Reservoir. At bottom of hill at stoplight, go straight, crossing US 40 onto RT 3130, River Road to Midway. Stay on River Road at roundabout until you get to Main Street in Midway, then turn right

onto Main Street. In 4 blocks turn left onto Center Street, RT 113 heading south. At stop sign turn right onto RT 189, Provo Canyon Road heading southwest to Deer Creek Reservoir and Orem. Half-way down Provo Canyon you can exit to Sundance and spend some time walking around Sundance Ski Resort. From here continue on Alpine Loop. If you stay on Provo Canyon Road and do not go to Sundance, as you come out of Provo Canyon before you get to Orem, turn right at stoplight onto RT 52, also called 800 N, and head west until you get to I-15. Pick up I-15 back to Salt Lake City.

East Canyon, Trappers Loop, Monte Cristo Pass, Bear Lake & Sardine Canyon: Start by heading east so you are on I-80 toward Park City. Exit I-80 at exit 134, turning left at stop sign onto RT 65. Follow this over East Canyon to East Canyon Reservoir and at Y turn left onto RT 66 and go around reservoir to Morgan. In Morgan pick up I-84 heading northwest. Exit at exit 96 and turn left onto Old Highway Road to Mountain Green. In Mountain Green, turn right onto RT 167, Trappers Loop Road to Huntsville. At stop sign at bottom of Trappers Loop, turn right onto RT 39 heading east. Watch for right hand turn at 100 S to stay on RT 39 for Monte Cristo Pass to Woodruff. In Woodruff turn left at stop sign onto RT 16 heading north to Randolph and Bear Lake. At intersection with US 30, turn left onto US 30 heading northwest to Laketown and Garden City. Buy gas in Garden City. You might try Merlin's for lunch. Leave Garden City by picking up US 89 heading west to Logan. At stoplight in Logan at intersection of US 89 and Main Street, turn left onto Main Street heading south. This is US 91/89. Follow this to Brigham City. You can either stay on US 89 which runs parallel with I-15 or pick up I-15 heading south back to Salt Lake City.

Suncrest Hwy, Timpanogus National Monument, Alpine Loop, Sundance Ski Resort, Croydon Canyon, Devils Slide, Trappers Loop, Ogden Canyon & Antelope Island: Start by heading south on I-15. Exit I-15 at exit 288, 14600 South. Turn left at stop sign at bottom of exit ramp, heading east on 14600 S, Highland Drive. At stoplight by gas stations, turn right onto Traverse Ridge Road. At top of hill, stop sign, turn left onto Suncrest Drive heading east. At bottom of hill at stoplight, turn left onto 1100 N, RT 92 heading east. This road will take you past Timpanogos Cave National Monument and becomes the Alpine Loop. Stay on RT 92, Alpine Loop Road. On the way down the southwest side of the mountain you will pass Sundance Ski Resort. At stop sign at bottom of mountain you intersect RT 189, Provo Canyon Road. Turn left onto RT 189 heading northeast toward Heber City. In Heber City, turn left at stoplight onto US 40 heading north. At stoplight a few miles out of Heber City, turn right onto RT 32 heading northeast toward Jordanelle Reservoir and Francis. In Francis at stop, turn left staying on RT 32 toward Kamas. Depending on your fuel capacity you may want to buy fuel in Kamas. Stay on RT 32 through Peoa and around Rockport Reservoir, through Wanship and Coalville. Just past Echo Reservoir, go under I-80 staying left on Echo Road toward Henefer. As you approach Henefer, stay right taking E Henefer Road to-

ward Croydon. In Croydon turn left onto 1900 N heading west. This will become RT 158 heading to Devils Slide. You really want to stop and look at Devils Slide. Pick up I-84 heading northwest toward Ogden. Exit I-84 at exit 96 to Mountain Green. Turn left from exit road onto Old Highway heading northwest to Mountain Green. Turn right onto RT 167 Trappers Loop heading north. At stop sign at bottom of Trappers Loop, turn left onto RT 39 toward Pineview Reservoir and Ogden. This road will become Ogden Canyon Road. As you come out of the canyon, at stoplight turn left onto Harrison Blvd, RT 203 heading south. After you pass I-84, turn right at 3<sup>rd</sup> intersection onto Sunset Drive heading west; this will become Antelope Drive. Continue on Antelope Drive to Davis County Antelope Causeway to Antelope Island. The Causeway is 7 miles to the Island. At Antelope Island you can either pay a fee and tour the Island or just enjoy the view across the Great Salt Lake. Hopefully we have timed this ride so that you get to Antelope Island just before sunset as the view across the water at sunset is really grand. Take the Causeway back, heading east and pick up I-15 heading south back to Salt Lake City.

Scofield Canyon, Skyline Drive, Loa Pass & Fish Lake: Start by heading south on I-15 toward Spanish Fork. Exit I-15 at exit 258 for US 6. Pick up US 6 heading southeast through Spanish Fork and continue east on US 6 going past the turnoff for US 89. Look for turnoff on south side of US 6 for RT 96 to Scofield. Take RT 96 heading south to Scofield; this will become marked as RT 264. At intersection of RT 264 and RT 31, turn left onto RT 31 heading south. This is known as Skyline Drive to Huntington. Buy fuel in Huntington. If you do not buy fuel here you really need to get fuel in Emery before you continue to Fish Lake. At Huntington pick up RT 10 heading south to Castle Dale and Emery. Go under I-70 and turn right onto RT 72. RT 72 will turn south toward Loa. Look on right side of road for Last Chance Road, and signs for Fish Lake. Turn right off of RT 72, Loa Pass, toward Fish Lake. Follow main road around Fish Lake into town of Fish Lake and Lakeside Resort; check out the old lodge for coffee and pie. Here this road will be marked as RT 25. Continue on RT 25 to where it intersects with RT 24. Turn right onto RT 24 heading north to Sigurd. Continue on RT 24, not I-70, heading north toward Salina. RT 24 will intersect with US 50 just before Salina. Turn right onto US 50 into Salina. In Salina pick up US 89 heading north. Great place for food is Mom's Café in Salina. Heading north on US 89 you will come to Gunnison. In Gunnison, you can either go straight which will put you on RT 28 heading north to Fayette and Levan where you can pick up I-15 to Nephi and back to Salt Lake, or you can turn right staying on US 89 heading first east then north to Manti and Fairview. If you take US 89, you might want to divert through Spring City. The entire city is on the Historical Register, The road will bring you back to US 89. You will intersect with US 6 where you will turn left to Spanish Fork, pick up I-15 and head back to Salt Lake City.

**Scofield, Fountain Green & Eureka**: Start by heading south on I-15 toward Spanish Fork. Exit I-15 at exit 258 for US 6. Pick up US 6 heading southeast through Spanish Fork and continue east on US 6 going past the turnoff for US 89. Look for turnoff on south side of US 6 for RT 96 to Scofield. Take RT 96

heading south to Scofield; this will become marked as RT 264 part way through Scofield Canyon. At intersection of RT 264 and RT 31, turn right heading west to Fairview. In Fairview turn right on US 89 heading south to Mount Pleasant. Just past Mount Pleasant, turn left onto State Hwy 117 to Spring City. Spring City is a charming old town well preserved with great old buildings and lots of history. In Spring City continue on Main Street which will become Pigeon Hollow Road which will intersect with US 89 and RT 132. At this intersect, go across US 89 and onto RT 132 which will head north to Moroni. In Moroni stay on RT 132 toward Fountain Green and Nephi. If you want to get back to Salt Lake quickly, just before Nephi you will intersect I-15 which you can ride back to Salt Lake City. Otherwise, ride into Nephi and continue west on RT 132 to RT 148. Turn right onto RT 148 heading northwest. When you intersect with US 6, turn right onto US 6 heading northeast toward Eureka. Turn left onto RT 68 heading north around west side of Utah Lake. Continue on RT 68 toward Bluffdale. Turn right onto RT 140, 144000 South, heading east. Pick up I-15 back to Salt Lake City.

Tour of west side of SL valley, UT Motorsports Campus (Miller Racetrack) & Johnson Pass: Start by heading south on I-15, and exit I-15 at exit 291 onto 12300 S heading west. Follow 12300 S as it becomes 12600 S and eventually Herriman Parkway heading west. Bear right as road becomes RT 111 heading north. Road name will become Bacchus Hwy. As you approach Magna, turn left onto 3500 S then right onto 9200 W heading north. At Main Street in Magna you will jog to right and then left so you are on 9100 W heading north. This will intersect with Hwy 201. Turn left onto Hwy 201 heading west. Follow signs to I-80 and pick up I-80 heading west. Exit I-80 onto RT 36 for Tooele. Turn right onto RT 138 then left onto Sheep Lane toward Motorsports Campus (formally Miller Motorsports Park). Race Track facility is on the west side of the road and is the site of the Superbike Races. If you have time, visit the car museum at Motorsports Campus, featuring original Ford Cobras and Ford GT-40's. Leave Motorsports Campus heading south on Sheep Lane and then turn right onto RT 112 toward Grantsville. In Grantsville turn left onto Main Street, RT 138 heading west. Turn left onto West Street, Mormon Trail Road, heading south. This will intersect with RT 199. Turn right onto RT 199, Johnson Pass Road heading west. After you ride Johnson Pass you can either turn around and ride the Pass again heading east or at Dugway, turn right onto RT 196 heading north. If you ride Johnson Pass back east, when RT 199 intersects with RT 36, turn left onto RT 36, then right onto RT 73 heading east to Lehi. Pick up I-15 back to Salt Lake City. If you take RT 196, this will intersect with I-80 which you can take back to Salt Lake City.

**Eureka Canyon, Garrison & Delta**: Start by heading south on I-15, and exit I-15 at exit 279 to Lehi onto RT 73 heading west. Turn right onto RT 68 heading south. At stop sign in Elberta, turn right onto US 6 heading west. Pass through Eureka and stay on UT 6. Turn right onto RT 148, Weiss Hwy, heading northwest. Follow this road as it winds west by northwest. When road swings to south it is renamed County Line Road and then Gandy Road. Road will intersect with US 50. At this intersec-


tion, you can either take US 50 heading east back to Delta and then head back to Salt Lake City, or cross US 50 onto RT 159 heading south to Garrison where you pick up RT 21 heading south southeast to Milford. In Milford when RT 21 intersects with RT 257, turn left onto RT 257 heading north. This will bring you into Delta where you head east and pick up US 6 back to Salt Lake City.

Great Basin National Park, Ely NV, Wendover &

Bonneville Salt Flats: Leave very early in the morning. Start by heading south on Redwood Road, 1700 W, RT 68 heading south. In Elberta turn right at stop sign heading west on US 6 toward Eureka. Continue past Eureka on US 6 to Delta. In Delta pick up US 50 heading west toward Nevada. Just across the Nevada state line, turn right to pick up RT 487 to Baker. In Baker, take RT 488 (Lehman Caves Road) heading west to Great Basin National Park. Stop and tour the Lehman Caves – about 1 hour – and then either take some of the roads in the Park to the mountain peaks or head back to US 50 and continue heading west toward Ely. In Ely you can enjoy the old part of town and visit the historic railroad museum. There is a great RR museum and you can ride the Ghost Train; time well spent. In Ely, pickup RT 93 heading north to Wendover. In Wendover, visit the restored Army Air Corp airfield where they trained on the B-29 Enola Gay for the bomb runs to Japan in WWII. Then pick up I-80 and ride east back to Salt Lake City. Just outside of Wendover is the Bonneville Salt Flats and the Bonneville Raceway where the Land Speed Trials are held. You can make this a nice two-day trip by staying in Ely overnight. There are some good motels in Ely and a couple of good restaurants for dinner.

### **Rear Shock Absorber may Crack and Detach**

If the rear shock absorber detaches from the swingarm, the motorcycle's handling would be affected, increasing the risk of a crash.

Ducati North America (Ducati) is recalling certain 2016-2017 Multistrada 1200 Enduro motorcycles. The motorcycle's rear shock absorber lower shockend eyelet may crack and possibly detach from the swingarm.

Ducati will notify owners, and dealers will replace the rear shock absorber assembly, free of charge. The recall is expected to begin May 22, 2017. Owners may contact Ducati customer service at 1-800-231-6696. Ducati's number for this recall is SRV-RCL-17-002.

**Bill Erhardt** from Helena, Mt. (BMW F650GS) writes... I picked up a used KAOKO Throttle Lock for my BMW F650GS with OEM Hand guards. Original buyer ordered the wrong one



so I got a nice discount. Installation was quite easy by following the instructions and I completed in about 20 minutes. I made three trips over the last week to test on the road with great success. To lock the throttle, you hold it with your pinky finger and roll back. It works great on flat

terrain and kept the F650GS right at my selected speed. Going up and down hill required slight adjustment as with all throttle locks as it is not a cruise control. The throttle lock releases by holding with your pinky finger and roll it forward. Overall I give it a 10 for ease of installation and a 9.5 for ease of use, and a 9.5 on road testing. It was sure nice to relieve my throttle hand and give it a break on short and long trips.

He goes on to say... Secondly, I did the finishing touches on my Aluma MC-10 Trailer by adding the spare tire left side. I added a tool box on the right side to hold a jack, tire wrench, and tie down straps. If any of the club folks
