#### SECRETARY/TREASURER'S CORNER

If you're still waffling over whether to attend the BMW MOA International Rally in Salt Lake City this month (July 13-16), it's time to get off that fence! All motorcycles, all the time, for three straight days; it's the closest thing to Christmas morning that a mature adult can get. My first (and only) MOA Rally was the one in Billings two years ago. I'd been to handful of small rallies before, but they did not prepare me for the event that was the big MOA rally. It was great, and I knew I'd want to return as soon as possible. Unfortunately, for those of us still in the "employed" minority, riding across the country to attend a rally isn't a viable option (unless we're prepared to transition to "unemployed" status). Well here comes the rally again, and it doesn't get much closer than Salt Lake City, and you can't beat the ride through Idaho to get there. So, when I learned the rally would be back in our neck of the woods, I put it on the calendar in permanent marker. That doesn't exactly make the decision permanent, so one additional way that I affirm decisions like this is prepaying. I don't trust my future self not to cancel as the date approaches, and there's always a reason to cancel, so I actually like prepaying for things to force future-me to follow through with things I know deep down I want to do. In this case, that strategy happily pays dividends to the tune of \$10.

Early online rally registration for MOA members is just \$55, versus \$65 at the rally door (for non-members, \$75 online versus \$85 at the door). Registration is easy on the BMW MOA webpage; for MOA members, you'll need to have your member number in order to receive the member rate. Once you press the "Yes, Process My Order" button, MOA sends a confirmation that you can print and bring to the rally for quick entry. BUT, you must register online by **July 14** to get the discount. So, get off that fence, prevent your future self from ruining your summer, and save yourself \$10. Push the button, and I'll see you in Salt Lake City.

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

#### SAFETY CORNER

Well, after a long wet winter where we worried about no traction and frost bite, we've certainly transitioned from a cool wet spring into what looks like it might be a smoking hot summer! So, we need to spend just a bit of time talking about the dangers of riding in extreme heat. Serious dehydration can occur without your knowing it. When temps rise into the 90's or above, the hot wind blowing over your skin wicks a tremendous amount of moisture out of your system even when riding in the appropriate riding apparel. If hydration is not replaced during a ride, this wicking action can lead you into serious dehydration which affects both your mental and physical abilities. Do you know that the more exposed skin you have while riding, the quicker and more severe is your probability of suffering from dehydration?! That's right, riding in a tee shirt or bare headed, increases your chance of dehydration, not to mention sunburn (and terminal road rash if you crash!!)! Keeping covered helps. Pouring water over the clothing under your riding apparel or wearing a cooling vest creates evaporation which is the same as air conditioning. If you repeat the soaking process through-out the day, you'll ride much cooler. Combine this with consistent intake of water and you'll ride a lot safer during these hot days and arrive at your destination without that completely "spent" feeling. Also...wear sunglasses that prevent the UV rays from reaching those "baby blues". Long term exposure to UV radiation is bad for your eyes and as we all know, your eyes play the major role in keeping you safe while riding. So, quit complaining about the heat (remember your complaining about the cold this winter!!??) enjoy the summer, ride a bunch, and stay cool!

In a series of back and forth e-mails between our esteemed President and the President of the Beehive Beemers club in Salt Lake City, we have been receiving fun info about what rides and eateries we might be interested in when we go to the BMWMOA rally in Salt Lake City on July 13-16.

The information is fairly extensive so we suggest you save this newsletter and the previous ones for the Beehive Beemer's series on rides and eateries. The following rides are "Bonus Rides" that may take more than a day. The information is from Jeff Thurmond, who is the President of the Beehive Beemers out of Salt Lake City.

#### **BONUS RIDES**

One Day Rides That Take Two Days To Finish

Scofield Canyon, Skyline Drive, Torrey, Scenic RT 12, Kodachrome Basin State Park, Bryce Canyon National Park, Cedar Brakes & Zion National Park: Start by heading south on I-15 toward Spanish Fork. Exit I-15 at exit 258 for US 6. Pick up US 6 heading southeast through Spanish Fork and continue east on US 6 going past the turnoff for US 89. Look for turnoff on south side of US 6 for RT 96 to Scofield. Take RT 96 heading south to Scofield; this will become marked as RT 264 partway through Scofield Canyon. At intersection of RT 264 and RT 31, turn left onto RT 31 heading south. This is known as Skyline Drive to Huntington. Buy fuel in Huntington. At Huntington pick up RT 10 heading south to Castle Dale and Emery. Go under I-70 and turn right onto RT 72. RT 72 will turn south toward Loa. You will intersect with RT 24 in Loa, so turn left into Loa on RT 24. As you come into Loa, a great place to eat is the County Café which will be on your right. Continue east on RT 24 to Torrey. You can either find lodging in Torrey or continue on depending on the time of day; if you got an early start there should be plenty of daylight left. In Torrey at the far east side of town, turn right onto RT 12. This road, RT 12, is usually listed in the top-10 motorcycle roads in America. There are good places to eat in Boulder and Escalante as you travel RT 12. In Cannonville on RT 12, to visit Kodachrome Basin (11 miles), turn left onto Main Street which becomes Kodachrome Road into the State Park. Continuing on RT 12 you will come to the road for Bryce Canyon National Park. Worth the visit. Back on RT 12 you will intersect with US 89. If you are tired, turn right on US 89 and ride north to Panguitch for the night. If you still have some ride left in you, turn left on US 89 and continue south to Kanab for the night. If you spend the night in Panguitch, leave Panguitch by heading south on RT 143, which will eventually swing west. When you get to Cedar Breaks National Monument, turn left onto RT 148 heading south. This will intersect with RT 14, turn left onto RT 14 heading west toward Cedar City. In Cedar City turn right onto RT 130 heading north. Buy fuel before you leave Cedar City. Stay on RT 130 heading north; do not get on I-15. RT 130 will take you to Minersville where you will pick up RT 21 heading north to Milford. In Milford pick up RT 257 heading north to Murdock, Malone, and Delta. RT 257 will intersect with US 50; turn right onto US 50 to Delta. In Delta pick up US 6 heading back to Salt Lake

City. If you rode to Kanab the first day, backtrack on US 89 heading north, and at the Mount Carmel junction, turn left onto US 9 heading west toward Zion National Park. You will come out of Zion Park in Springdale, which is a delightful town. Continue on US 9 toward La Verkin; and in La Verkin turn right onto RT 17 to Toquerville. RT 17 will intersect with I-15; pick up I-15 heading north to Cedar City. In Cedar City, follow the directions above, e.g. pick up RT 130 heading north.

Daniel's Summit, Douglas Pass, Grand Junction, Gateway, Naturita, Dead Horse Point, Canyonlands National Park & Arches National Park, and Solder

**Summit**: Start by heading east so you are on I-80 heading toward Park City. Exit I-80 onto US 40 heading to Heber City. In Heber City continue on US 40 over Daniel's Summit to Duchesne and Vernal. In Dinosaur, just across the Colorado border, turn right onto RT 64 heading south toward Rangely. Just outside Rangely turn right onto RT 139 heading south to Douglas Pass. RT 139 will intersect with I-70; pick up I-70 to Grand Junction. Exit I-70 for Grand Junction, picking up US 50 heading south southwest. Just past Grand Junction on US 50 you will come to Whitewater. Turn right onto RT 141 heading southwest toward Gateway. In Gateway, visit the car museum at The Gateway Resort; well worth the time. When you leave Gateway, on RT 141, head toward Naturita. RT 141 will intersect with RT 90 just before Naturita; turn right onto RT 90 heading south then west toward Bedrock and La Sal. At La Sal Junction, where RT 90 intersects with RT 191, you can either turn right to Moab or turn left to Monticello. There are two entrances to Canyonlands NP. One entrance to Canyonlands, where the famous Newspaper Rock is located, is between La Sal Junction and Monticello. The other is a few miles north of Moab. This entrance to Canyonlands is also the way to Dead Horse Point, a place you will want to visit. Also, north of Moab you can visit Arches National Park. A few miles north of La Sal Junction is Hole In The Rock, a place you will want to visit. By staying in either Monticello or Moab for the night you will have time to explore the National Parks and still be able to ride back to Salt Lake City on the second day of your trip. To get back to Salt Lake City from Moab, take RT 191 to I-70, pick up I-70 heading west, and exit onto RT 191 heading north to Price. Take the bypass around Price and outside Helper pick up US 6 heading northwest over Solder's Summit to Spanish Fork where you pick up I-15 heading north to Salt Lake City.

Soda Springs, the Palisades, Swan Valley, Victor, Jackson & Kemmerer, Evanston, Monte Cristo Pass or Mirror Lake Hwy: Start by heading north on I-15 toward Ogden and Brigham City. Exit at exit 362 for Brigham City and pick up US 89 toward Logan. In Logan go straight on Main Street which will become RT 91 heading north to Smithfield and Preston ID. In Preston go right onto RT 34 heading north northeast. Stay on RT 34 heading north to Grace and Soda Springs. RT 34 will intersect with US 30 where you turn right onto US 30 heading east to Soda Springs. In Soda Springs, turn left staying on RT 34 toward Wayan and Freedom. RT 34 will intersect with US 89 in Freedom; turn left onto US 89 heading north to Alpine and Alpine Junction. At Alpine Junction, buy fuel. Depending on the time of day, you can either turn right at Alpine Junction onto RT 26/89 heading east northeast to Jackson, or continue due north on RT 26 to the Palisades and Swan Valley. The Swan Valley route is longer but very pretty. If you do the long route to Swan Valley, in Swan Valley turn right onto RT 31 to Victor and in Victor turn right onto RT 33 to Jackson. RT 33 in Idaho will become RT 22 in Wyoming heading to Jackson. Find lodging in Jackson and spend the evening exploring the town on foot. For the next day heading back to Salt Lake City you can either backtrack or for a totally different route leave Jackson heading south on RT 189 to Hoback. At Hoback Junction turn right onto RT 191/189 heading southwest to Bondurant and Daniel. At Daniel Junction, turn right onto RT 189 heading south to Daniel and Marbleton and La Barge and Kemmerer. Kemmerer is the city where the first JC Penny store was founded. The original store is still there; worth a visit. Stay on RT 189 heading south and you will intersect with I-80; pick up I-80 heading west to Evanston. In Evanston buy fuel. You can either head back to Salt Lake City on I-80, or take Monte Cristo Pass, or take Mirror Lake Hwy. For Monte Cristo, pick up US 89 heading north to Woodruff. In Woodruff turn left onto RT 39 heading west over Monte Cristo Pass into Huntsville. In Huntsville either stay on RT39 heading west down Ogden Canyon, then turn left onto Harrison Blvd at bottom of canyon heading west and then pick up I-15 back to Salt Lake City. Or in Huntsville, on the western outskirts of Huntsville turn left onto RT 167 heading south over Trappers Loop. By now it will be getting twilight and deer will be coming down to forage. To avoid the deer around East Canyon, in Mountain Green at the bottom of Trappers Loop at stop sign, turn right and pick up I-84 heading west toward Ogden. As you come out of the canyon, exit I-84 onto US 89 heading west which will eventually drop you onto I-15 heading back to Salt Lake City.

Sardine Canyon, Bear Lake, Lava Hot Springs, Idaho Falls, Craters of the Moon National Monument & Twin Falls: Start by heading north on I-15 toward Ogden and Brigham City. Exit at exit 362 for Brigham City and pick up US 89 toward Logan. In Logan off of Main Street, turn right at 400 N onto US 89 heading east up Logan Canyon to Garden City at Bear Lake. Turn left staying on US 89 heading north to Paris ID. Just past Paris, turn left onto RT 36 heading northwest to Liber-

ty and Mint Creek. This will intersect with RT 34. Turn right onto RT 34 heading north toward Grace and Soda Springs. This will intersect with US 30. Turn left onto US 30 heading west to Lava Hot Springs. This will intersect with I-15 where you pick up I-15 heading north toward Pocatello. In Pocatello either continue north on I-15 toward Blackfoot and Idaho Falls, or pick up RT 191 heading north. RT 191 runs parallel to I-15. There are a number of decent motels in Idaho Falls for lodging and a few good restaurants. The next day, leave Idaho Falls by picking up RT 20 heading west toward Arco. Arco is where the first atomic power plant was located; tour the museum. In Arco turn left staying on RT 20, now heading southwest. This will take you through Craters of the Moon National Monument, and will become RT 26. In Shoshone, pick up RT 93 heading south to Twin Falls. In Twin Falls you will pick up RT 30/93 heading west, then turn right staying on RT 93 heading south to Jackpot. Stay on RT 93 which will intersect with I-80 in Wells NV and pick up I-80 heading east to Wendover and back to Salt Lake City. If hungry try the buffet at the Peppermill in Wendover. If you have not done so before, visit Bonneville Salt Flats Raceway outside Wendover.



But, over and above all of this, what I most appreciate about who you are is your deep and abiding love for your family – wife, son, daughters, grand kids, cousins, and, yes, the four-legged furry members of your family. We, your biking brothers and sisters, wish you well on your final journey. And we hold Debbie and the rest of your family in our hearts as they journey towards healing and happiness.


