Some good news for members...with initial help from Kevin Huddy as well as others, we've decided one of the higher goals of this club is promoting rider safety. This year we'll institute a scholarship program (for paid members only) to offset your costs of taking certified classes that help make you a better and safer rider. Since this is new it will be a work in progress, but for this year the parameters to qualify for a scholarship will be:

Must be a paid member and you Must take a certified class. For sure MMSF classes will qualify. Some offroad classes will qualify. Some track schools may qualify. Classes will have to be accredited and you will have to show a receipt for payment and a completion certificate. If you have any question as to whether a class will qualify, call me, especially if this money is all important for that class. All receipts will be submitted to Secretary Treasurer Chris Keyes prior to reimbursement.
Again, since this is new to us, we want to be conservative with our club funds. We're in good shape financially. That's why we can offer this program, but we don't want to deplete the treasury over a year or two, so how much we offer this year will be subject to that. I believe we may offer up to $\$ 50.00$ per person but limit it to no more than a total of $\$ 350$ per year out of the treasury. If we have lots of takers we can pay out less, say $\$ 25.00$ per person, and

woke up on the $19^{\text {th }}$ of February with outside temperatures at 3 degrees and the boiler downstairs huffing and puffing to keep up with interior demands. We are propane powered so we try not to spend it foolishly and set interior thermostats at 63 degrees. The garage where 'Vader', the Can Am Spyder (doesn't every guy name his ride?), lives was at worst, hovering at a comfortable 45 degrees. Clearly, riding weather is a long way off. And, with those temperatures the only places to wash off a bike that didn't get cleaned before winter set in, were all closed or otherwise unable to deliver water at below freezing. My hoses were coiled up in the barn with the well pump turned off. It may have been possible to load the Spyder on a trailer and truck it to an operating car wash but the water would have frozen on the paint work before I could chamois it off. Makes sense to read the articles in the newsletter and then act when appropriate!

So, here I sit doing the more comfortable activity of writing a column to fill some space in the newsletter and communicate some motorcycle stuff to the membership...just so we all keep an eye on the weather. Having positively moved to Montana from the big $C$ west of here years ago, I can honestly say that the only thing I miss about the Golden state is that the weather was rideable all year long. The only downside to that was the traffic you had to endure to get to those colorful back roads the magazines talk about. Yes, and I did lane split there but it scared the hell out of me every time I felt I had to do it... because there always was some jerk lurking, watching his mirrors, ready to squeeze the lane down to force you to apply brakes and wait for traffic to move again...putting you in serious trouble if he kept that narrow gap moving forward. Years ago, in my 20's, when I bought my first bike, a Puch 125 cc single, I made the mistake of trying to pass stalled traffic on the right. I perceived there was room still on the asphalt. ## 2018 PARK2PARK CONTEST

 ow for something totally new to help us slim down those waistlines after gorging at all those cafes the last two summers. Kevin Huddy, who has ably managed the prior Café 2 Café contests, has sought early retirement, so the Grahams (Carol and Gary) were coerced into taking over this year. The purpose of the Montana BMW Riders' PARK2PARK contest is to check off another item on our bucket lists, take us to some of the prettier areas of the state and to give us an incentive to spend more time in the saddle. The idea is to get on your bike, link up with some friends, ride to one of the beautiful Montana State Parks and soak up the ambience. You may want to load your camping gear since many of the parks have campgrounds. You will even get some off-pavement experience. While you are riding around the state keep your eyes out for the cafes that we feasted at the last two years for repeat visits. While the top three riders in two categories will receive recognition, the fun is in participating. To receive credit for visiting a park the rider must submit a photograph via email as described below:

General: Participants will be placed into one of two categories; the Retired category or Worker category. Retired is intended for those that are not working for any reason, all others are Workers. Participants will selfselect the category in which they will compete. Both categories will have a first, second and third place award based on the number of parks visited. In addition, there will be a Grand Prize for the person(s) who has the greatest number of parks visited regardless of the category in which he/she competed.

T-shirts are available for participants. Cost of the T-shirt is $\$ 15$ and is optional. You may participate without buying a t -shirt.

## Rules:

Riders must register prior to starting the contest. To register for the Montana Riders' PARK 2 PARK, send an email to the Grahams
gandcgraham@gmail.com)
which should include your name, your chosen category (Worker or Retired) and T-shirt size if you plan to purchase one (payment instructions will be provided via email). Riders may register and begin the PARK2PARK ride at any time up until the end date of the competition.

You must be a member of the Montana BMW Riders in good standing (dues paid) prior to beginning the contest.

The contest runs from

## 1 April until 1 November 2018.

On the attached list of Parks you will find a nearby city/town/wide spot in the road and GPS coordinates. A good resource to use in planning is the Montana State Parks website (http:// stateparks.mt.gov/), which has links to separate pages for each Park describing the park, open hours, etc. State roadmaps, of course, have the Parks marked as well. The attached list of Parks also contains information on whether it is necessary to travel on unpaved roads to reach a particular Park and our rough estimate of the miles to be so traveled. Also, if there is a Café 2 Café eatery near the Park, we have tried to note that in the list.

You must ride a motorcycle (two or three wheels) to the Parks.

Once you have registered, in order to get credit for each Park you visit, you must send a picture of the Park entry sign (readable) to the Grahams which should show, in addition to the sign, your smiling face/faces (selfies acceptable taken with or without a selfie stick) and, if the location allows, your bike/bikes. Include a time/date stamp on the pictures or indicate the time and date of the visit in the email. Size all your pictures so that they are 1MB or less in size. Please limit the number of pictures to three - five per email. No picture will be considered if received after November 9,2018 . We must be able to read the name of the Park in the picture.

Those riding two-up should submit one picture showing both people; it will be considered a single entry.

The intended spirit of the contest ride is to inspire members to ride more often and to do so with old and new friends. The intent certainly is not to approach the event as an Iron Butt ride in which the rider tries to visit as many Parks as possible in as short of a time as possible. With that in mind no more than five Parks may count in the contest tally in a single day.

Keep in mind that each of these Parks have a purpose for existing, so take your time and explore it and the visitor's center if there is one.

The number of Parks visited, as proven by properly submitted pictures, will determine finishing spots. If there is a tie, then the riders will share the position. For example, if there are two riders in first place, they will share first and there will be no third place. If there are three riders in first place, then they will share first and there will be no second or third place finisher.

## Special Categories:

Long Distance: The rider who rides the furthest distance to a single Park. Distance will be determined from the rider's home to the Park via the route selected by Google Maps. If a rider wishes to be considered for this recognition, then the rider must include their home address and distance ridden in the email in which the picture is submitted and indicate that he/ she is competing for the distance recognition.

Senior Riders: The rider age 70 or older with the most Parks. (Must reach age 70 on or before 1 November 2018)

Four Corners Award: This is for participants who travel to the four Parks that are in the corners of Montana. (Thompson Chain of Lakes State Park near Happy's Inn, Brush Lake State Park near Dagmar, Medicine Rocks State Park near Ekalaka and Bannack State Park near Dillon)

 SAFETY CORNER s certified gear heads, I'm sure you've all at least heard of the development of Vehicle 2 Vehicle (V2) communication systems and certainly the effort underway to produce autonomous (self-driving) vehicles (AV). One of the underlying themes of both arenas is to cut down the number of vehicle accidents/fatalities. The implied (and probably accurate) weak point is the vehicle operator! We know from the statistics of motorcycle/motor vehicle interaction that 1) the accident is usually the fault of the vehicle driver, 2 ) the most common statement is "I never saw him", and 3) the motorcyclist is the one most often injured or killed.

One of the continuing concerns of the motorcycle industry and us, as riders, is the push toward both AV and V2V and how that will affect us on motorcycles. Bosch Mobility Solutions has announced a prototype V 2 V communication that it describes as a "digital protection shield." The company predicts it could prevent $1 / 3$ of all motorcycle accidents. The new Bosch system uses ITSGS which is the public wireless local area network standard. This ensures that it can communicate with multiple types of existing and future V2V systems, not just other Bosch systems. With the Bosch system, parked and idling vehicles can also transmit data. They can present as much or more of a hazard as a moving vehicle, so this will likely be advantageous for both cars and bikers in preventing accidents. Their system will communicate with motorcyclists through the use of Bluetooth.

A ride close to Missoula that is perhaps overlooked is the Fish Creek road, 30 miles of gravel between US Highway 12 and Interstate 90. Larry Banister and I did the south to north ride late in 2016, a bit dusty. We turned on Fish Creek Road (also listed as NF 33) about one-half mile west of Lolo Hot Springs. The route follows Fish Creek Road from end-to-end with only a few other roads branching off - the route seemed logical, so GPS didn't seem to be a need. That was good since neither of us had a map let alone a navigation device.

If you are feeling touristy, the tallest pine tree in Montana (listed as 350 feet) is at about mile post 26 from the US 12 entrance. The turn -off is on the left and, though not well marked, is easy to spot as the road is close to Fish Creek.

If you are in the area, you can turn left (west) on the Southside Road toward Rivulet, about mile post 28, and follow that road for approximately 2.5 miles and check of No. 16, Fish Creek State Park on the 2018 Park 2 Park contest.

At the I-90 access, you can cross over to the frontage road (old US 10) head east over the Cry bridge and pick up I-90 East. River View, at the first exit to Alberton is a pretty fair rider nourishment establishment. US 10 from Alberton to the Nine Mile access to $\mathrm{I}-10$ is a casual and traffic free ride.

If you are not quite ready to park for the day, turn left on the Remount Road to the US Forest Service Remount Station, a right there will eventually bring you to Huson, skipping I-10 for the entire ride.

## Chris Keyes' Corner

WARNING: 40,000 MOTORCYCLISTS ARE COMING


P
rior to my sabbatical in Guatemala in 2016, I signed up for email travel advisories from the U.S. State Department. These are periodic warnings to American citizens abroad about areas to avoid. An advisory might warn of a rash of crime, a volcanic eruption, a protest blocking a highway, that sort of thing - in other words, normal Guatemala stuff. Upon returning to Montana, I never took myself off that State Department advisory email list, so I still receive an occasional advisory from them. It's kind of a fun way to keep up on 'current events' down there. But last month I received an advisory that really grabbed my attention:

The U.S. Embassy in Guatemala has received a report that on Saturday, February 3rd starting from 7:00 a.m., approximately 40,000 motorcyclists, collectively known as Caravana del Zorro, will be departing from Zone 1 towards Esquipulas. They will be traveling northbound on CA-9 towards Rio Hondo, Zacapa (Km 136). From there, they will head to Esquipulas. Traffic conditions are expected to be slow due to congestion. There will reportedly be an excessive number of motorcyclists on the road, thus increasing the possibility of traffic accidents.

This warning inspired in me a few reflections. They are best read in the voice of television commentator Andy Rooney (and yes, according to this club's demographics, you know who Andy Rooney is):

Exactly what number qualifies as "an excessive number of motorcyclists"? Probably most of us can agree that 40,000 is a hell of a lot. I don't know about excessive though. Wouldn't that depend on which motorcyclist you ask? The solo rider probably chafes at 2 . As for me, 40,000 mobile motorcyclists are more intriguing than alarming, and not something I necessarily want to avoid.

A 7:00 am start time? What sort of hell-raising outlaw rebel mob is this Caravana del Zorro?! How does one find so many motorcyclists promptly prepared in a ride-ready state at 7:00 a.m.?
A fact of life along Guatemala highways is that you're at constant risk of being flattened by anything that moves. Are motorcycles your greatest concern? Among road threats, nothing is more dangerous than the diesel-belching chicken buses: aged American school buses that have been repurposed as public transportation, hot-rodded to hurtle an overcapacity of people and cargo at inadvisable speeds on worn springs and bald tires, and colorfully decorated to distract any passenger from the morbid yet realistic notion that the contraption is as likely to deliver you to the afterlife as to your posted destination. Are you more concerned by that roving menace, or a fleet of buzzy single cylinder motorbikes?
The most profound threat here may be to environmental quality. Worth noting is the fact that public restrooms in Guatemala are scarce. Assuming an average rider dispenses 1 pint of fluid waste, we are talking about 5,000 gallons of contaminant inflicted upon the route's soils and waterways. Let's not even tabulate Numero Dos.
Upon reflection, I'm not sure the public along the route needs to worry excessively about this event. But aren't you glad you're not a resident of Esquipulas? Those poor folks are probably due for an interesting evening.

I'm sure the State Department official who wrote this advisory felt he was dutifully cautioning Americans to gird themselves against this calamity. But that wasn't my reaction. It was closer to: Dammit, wish I was in Guatemala! I'd like nothing more than to hop on a 200cc bike, boot a feral gutter dog out of the way, and join the Caravana del Zorro. Add one more to the bucket list!

## More...MONTANA BMW RIDER'S RIDES

Arlee to Salmon Lake on US 83 is about 40 miles of unpaved (gravel) road. This is a good one to have an active GPS device. Roads by the same or similar names, most well-travelled and all seem to be headed in the right direction provide a lot of choices
along the way. Fortunately, most reconnect and lead to Placid Lake, and Placid Lake State Park (Park 2 Park contest?).

Starting at Jocko Road about one-half mile south of Arlee and head east will tie you into Jocko Canyon Road. At about 12 miles in, a lesser used road branches right, which appears to also be named "Jocko Canyon Road." Bear to the left, also Jocko Canyon Road, but more traveled and a better road. This will eventually become Jocko Road. You are on the correct road if you pass by Lower Jocko Lake, Black Lake and Upper Jocko Lake, about 23 miles from the start.


A pause at Lower Jocko Lake while the Ride Master confirms our location.

After leaving the lakes, the road will eventually come to a fork with both roads named "N. Placid Lake Road". Take your pick both meet in a few miles.

Ride Master says, "Where are we?"


About a mile beyond the merging of the N. Placid Lake Roads, Placid Creek Road branches off to the left and will again cross $N$. Placid Lake Road, now identified as Road 68. This road passes through a residential area along Placid Lake and leads to the park. Otherwise, the Placid Creek Road which skirts the residential area seems to be the better choice. This road meets US 83 in about five miles, a mile north of Salmon Lake.

Although a bit confusing this is a good ride with miles of nice mountain scenery.
