Not all of the rally information is available yet but I do hope that we as a group will volunteer as much time as we can to assist with the rally. What is known is:

The 2020 MOA Rally will be held in Great Falls, Montana.

Online rally registration will open on 1 January 2020, at *BMWMOA.ORG* and is available until the rally ends. Registration forms will be available in BMW Owners News Registration incentives will be announced on the website and in the magazine as they become available.

For your full rally registration fee (excluding children and day passes), you will receive admission to the rally for Thursday, Friday, and Saturday, entry into door prize drawings, eligibility for our Grand Prize drawings and the BMW MOA prize bike. Your registration also includes camping fees for the Montana ExpoPark.

Anyone arriving prior to Thursday **must be an identified volunteer** with a rally committee and will be expected to volunteer for rally set-up duties. Rally set-up is a big effort and the set-up volunteers need an opportunity to get their work done in a timely fashion. Please give these volunteers a chance to get the rally ready before your arrival.

Day passes will be available at Rally Registration on Saturday only. Day passes will allow access to the event, but will not include door prize tickets, pin, patch, or rally program. Cost is \$TBD for all day on Saturday.

The Rally is open to BMW MOA members and their guests. Rally attendance is contingent on abiding by the rules and policies of the BMW MOA, and at the discretion of the Rally Chairs. We reserve the sole right to deny admission and/ or remove persons from the rally grounds based on our discretion.

While MOA members receive a registration discount, non-members may join the MOA online or at the rally registration rate and receive the MOA member discount. A one-year membership is \$49 for U.S. residents. Please see the BMW MOA website for the extensive list MOA member benefits which easily off-set the annual membership fee.

While the BMW MOA National Rally is specific to BMW motorcycles, we welcome riders and guests on all marques. All bikes must meet local noise abatement regulations and rally attendance is contingent on abiding by the rules and policies of the BMW MOA and the discretion of the Rally Chairs.

Upon arrival:

- First things first. Register for the rally or check-in if you registered online before the rally. Check in at the registration building to receive your wristband, rally program, door prize tickets, etc.
- If you are camping, proceed to the designated camping area and pick a spot to pitch your tent. Meet your neighbors, make new friends and relax.
- Once you've settled in, visit the Rally Central to turn in your door prize tickets, pick up your pin and rally mug and sign up at the Awards Booth...you never know what you may win!

First time at an MOA International Rally? We're glad you're here! Be sure to stop in and introduce yourself at the Ambassador's Booth. Need to charge your electronic devices? We've got you covered at the Electronics Charging Station. Be sure to bring your own cord. Check out the MOA Gear Shop for Rally shirts and other cool MOA items. Visit the MOA Foundation Booth to learn more about rider safety, education and training.

Last, but certainly not least, start having fun!

VOLUNTEERING:

Lots of work happens before the Rally even opens. Contact the Volunteer Committee Chair, Paul Ruffel for current needs. At the rally, the Volunteer Booth is located in the MOA building and you can sign up to volunteer there. Stop by and sign up for a shift or two. NOTHING would happen without our fantastic volunteers!

CAMPING:

Individual campsite reservations are not required and there are plenty of grassy and shady areas for tent camping in the designated camping areas. Please do not attempt to reserve space for late arrivals. Chartered Clubs can reserve space by contacting Rick Koscher, the Chartered Club Camping Committee Chair.

The grounds are large enough that no designated quiet area will be identified. First-timers should remember that ear plugs can help make your night restful. We ask all rally goers to practice common courtesy throughout the rally grounds.

Campers may drive cars to their selected camping area and set up camp. Please note you may be required to move your car to suitable parking depending on specific site conditions.

Cordoning off camping space for future arrivals is strictly prohibited. Group camping for MOA clubs is available. Contact the Chartered Club Group Camping Chair or Rally Chairs for information.

I think I may drag our travel trailer to Great Falls and park it for the full week. I have not yet found out if there will be RV parking at the site. There is a KOA in Great Falls and some other RV parks, book well in advance. There are of course many fine hotels in Great Falls, again book early.

Let's help make it a great Montana rally.





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

Day 2 we rode from Montrose along the Million Dollar highway to Durango. We then headed to Mesa Vere National park and explored some cliff dwellings.







On August 28th, my friends, Brian and Wendy Blevins and I, departed on our R1250GSA's, on a 2 week, 3400 mile trip from Missoula through British Columbia, Alberta, the Yukon Territory, SE Alaska, returning back through BC and Alberta, home to Missoula. The highlight of the trip was two and a half days on the Alaska Marine Highway Ferry from Haines, Alaska to Prince Rupert, BC. The ferry made brief stops in Juneau, Kake, Petersburg, Wrangell, and Ketchikan. While in route we saw numerous seals, otters, killer whales, dolphins, and an estimated 75 to 100 humpback whales. Other highlights were the Icefields Parkway between Lake Louise and Jasper, Alberta, and daily wildlife sightings; 6 black bears, 3 grizzlies, numerous big horn sheep, a

mountain goat, and the biggest bull elk any of us had ever viewed. Interesting overnight stops were in Dawson Creek, mile "0" of the Alaska highway, Watson Lake, YT and it's "sign post forest". Also, Whitehorse, capital of the YT, Haines, Alaska, a fun little fishing village, and Prince Rupert, BC, a growing container ship port. We were blessed with great fall weather, except for a bit of rain the last two days, and the start of the brilliant yellow fall colors.

Maximum off-road Ride

ow do you ride from Lolo, Montana to Superior, Montana for lunch on a route that never crosses Interstate 90 and rarely includes any paved roads? Chris Froines, off-road rider extraordinaire and three of his fellow riders achieved that. Chris on his Honda Africa Twin, Mike Nesbitsal (Hamilton) riding a Honda CFR250, James McCubbin on a Yamaha WR250 and, Brad (*last name unknown*) riding a KTM 690 planned a ride over the Labor Day weekend following the track shown below. They were successful, but did have to forego the Elk Meadow portion from the Lochsa Lodge on the return leg, finishing the ride on Highway 12. The 100 miles from Spruce Tree Camp Ground to the Lochsa was a seven hour challenge.

Two— 250cc bikes, a 690 cc and a 1,000 cc (all nominal) were all able to carry the loads without incident for two pretty grueling days. Determination probably matches size.



Superior, Montana situated between the Clark Fork river and Interstate 90 about 50 miles west of Missoula. After 'fuel' at Durango's you can launch yourself south on Forest Service roads into Idaho, or up stream along the south side of the Clark Fork river to Alberton, or north into the Nine Mile valley.






CMA Whitehall Rally - Whitehall, Montana (continued)




