VOLUNTEERING:

I was asked and agreed to serve as the post-rally cleanup chairperson. As such I am hoping to enlist the aid of local MTBMWriders and those willing to stay on just a little longer on Sunday. If we have a good crew of approximately 10 people we should be able to finish and leave by early afternoon. RV PARKING:

When I was at the facility on October 15th I met the RV Parking Chairman and together we looked the situation over. RV Parking is limited perhaps as low as 51 units. The RV spaces are not that attractive with only about 30 full service and 21 electrical only. While I had planned to drag my RV trailer there I have changed my mind allowing more room for those coming from much further away. A search of RV Parks Great Falls reveals only Dick's RV Park and 406-452-0333 and the KOA 406-727-3191. I imagine space will be limited and a very early reservation is recommended.

CAMPING:

Anyone arriving prior to Thursday must be an identified volunteer with a rally committee and will be expected to volunteer for rally set-up duties. Rally set-up is a big effort and the set-up volunteers need an opportunity to get their work done in a timely fashion. Please give these volunteers a chance to get the rally ready before your arrival.

I had seen Facebook comments about the lack of grass for camping judged by those viewing Google Earth images. In reality there is plenty of very nice grass camping, it just doesn't show that well from satellite imagery. There is also some nice shade from tall and mature trees as well.

CHARTERED CLUB CAMPING AREAS:

While we were there on October 15th we looked over areas for chartered club camping and found a couple of very good areas with electrical hookup potential for club use and discussed large tent rental possibilities for chartered clubs as well. Kevin and Annie Huddy were asked if they would chair this responsibility, should we desire a MTBMWriders camping area (and I assume we would) we should speak up as early as possible, we might have an inside edge. We could certainly setup a nice accommodation area for the club.

ACCOMODATIONS:

Should you not be a camper there are of course numerous hotels and motels in Great Falls within a few miles. Again, I would suggest booking early as they will certainly fill up and prices will increase as well. One of the closest ones, Staybridge Suites, is already very high, they must have heard about the rally.



Ambassador's Corner - Annie and Kevin Huddy



And so it begins; we are six weeks into Fall and already Winter seems to have come to stay. Feelings of anger, sorrow and betrayal course through our bodies as we lament the fall that never really happened here in Tropical Montana. When people would ask us why we retired and moved to Montana from Fairbanks, AK we would tell them it was because of the short and easy Winters here in Big Sky Country. We have learned that the winters here are a bit shorter and a bit easier, but that does not mean they are short and easy.

So what is to be done? We suggest it is time to begin getting ready to ride again when the snow and ice subsides (Unless you have a two-wheel drive Ural and can ride in the snow).

Getting ready for the next season can involve a wide variety of tasks:

Maintain your riding gear:

Treat your riding boots with a leather treatment that refurbishes the leather and makes it at least water resistant. Inspect them and if repairs are needed (Seams stitched, zippers repaired, new soles or heels) then get them to a cobbler. Now cobblers can be hard to find but here in Helena we are blessed with an excellent cobbler called **Ryan's Boot and Shoe Repair at, 919 Euclid Ave, Helena, MT 59601, 406 442 5215.**

Clean and inspect your helmet. If have ever removed and cleaned your helmet liner, then I know two things about you. First you have uttered the word "Yewwww" and second, you will clean it again. It does not take long for that thing to get disgusting. Remove the liner and cheek pads and let them soak in warm water with some Woolite in it. While you are waiting, wipe down the interior of the helmet with a damp cloth. Pay particular attention to that space right in front of your nose and mouth where you sneezed all those times last summer. Rinse the liner and pads well... very well and then let dry. I let them tumble dry until they are just barely damp, then let air dry. I am concerned that if it goes too long in a dryer the liner could distort.

Clean and waterproof your jacket and pants. Follow your manufacturer's instructions on what sort of cleaner and sealant to use. They seem to all recommend you do not use any sort of common washing detergent. Inspect your seams and zippers and repair as needed. During the riding season I sometime wash my riding gear in just plain old water. It removes bug guts and, because my gear is mostly black, it comes out looking very good. Washing in plain warm water tends not to affect the water resistance of the material.

Maintain your motorcycle(s):

This is, of course, a very broad topic so I will address an approach more than specific tasks. First, our long winters can be a bit of a blessing in that it allows ample time to tend to maintenance without causing lost riding time. I always detail our bikes in the winter, not so much for appearance as for letting me get eyes on every nook and cranny to see how things are going (are things where they are supposed to be, are they tight, are they looking worn, are they getting corroded?). Look behind things. Pull the seat, fairing bits, side panels and radiator guards. I found about half pound of dead bugs behind one of my radiator guards last winter.


Of course you should do the scheduled maintenance stuff such as changing fluids and filters, but do some other tasks that are not normally scheduled. Clean the dead bugs out of the radiator. Be careful... you can damage those delicate cooling fins quite easily. Soak the fins with warm water or hydrogen peroxide until things are nice and squishy, then flush with running water out of a hose. I have also used compressed air at very low pressures. Either way this will be messy. Disassemble, clean, and lubricate your shifter linkage and pivot. Check your wheels and spokes for damage and adjustment, and check the wheel bearings too. Pay attention to your center and side stands and make sure they are well lubricated.

And lastly, plan ahead. I try to make sure I start a riding season with all our bikes serviced so that I have to do as little as possible during the summer. Consider doing a major service in the winter even if it is not due for a while. I'll check the valves on our bikes even if they are not due for 6,000 miles. That way I may get through a summer without needing to do a valve check more than once. If you do it yourself then you will have more time to do it. If you have it done at a shop then you are likely going to get reduced labor rates in the winter and possibly the shop will pick-up and deliver your bike.

Plan:

Whether you are planning to ride the Silk Road with Helge Pedersen or planning a series of day rides, then Winter is the time to plan it. Studying maps, updating camping gear, making reservations and putting together riding groups are all ways to keep the motorcycling fires burning. Hopefully, your planning for 2020 includes attending the BMWMOA Rally in Great Falls in late June.

On a different topic. No one has submitted their request to be reimbursed for motorcycle training taken this past year. Now is the time to do it or the opportunity may be lost. Contact me (Kevin) at *huddykl@gmail.com* to request reimbursement.

Members **Paul Oliver** (Bozeman) and Mike **Kreikemeier** (Belgrade) have managed to combine three passions (or maybe afflictions) - motorcycles, airplanes and the outdoors into a single hobby. Paul's Cessna Stationair, that he sometimes refers to as his "flying SUV", and Mike's Kitfox, a Short Takeoff and Landing (STOL) kit plane are shown below at some of their adventures. Mike also pilots a Mooney airplane on longer flights to real airports. I reached Mike by mobile phone once, and discovered he was pedaling his electric bike to his mother's home after having unloaded it from his Mooney.

Paul assured me winter is a great time to fly - the cold dense air enhances the airplane's performance. Just think, snow on the ground - no problem. Simply load up your bike and fly south for a couple of days.



Paul adds another dimension to the term, "working from home". He assured me that although it looks like he is parked in a jack rabbit pasture, there is an air strip close by. A 60 mile jeep road connects this location to a paved highway. These photos from October 2015 show his Cessna covered and tied down and his Yamaha 225 loaded for a few days of trail riding.

The bicycles get the same treatment, front wheel removed and stuffed in the back passenger area of the air craft.





Rider Profile Fred Reed



Fred and Susan Reed are participants at many of the MONTANA BMW RIDERS club functions.
Fred has been a member since 2001, who with his 1989 BMW R100RS are at most of the Huddy Tech Day events.

Fred is a native Montanan raised on a ranch near Sidney where he

started his motorcycle riding on a Harley-Davidson 125 two cycle. This is where he also acquired a 1940's Harley-Davidson 'tank-shifter' and foot clutch which he eventually sold to a local car dealer to start college at what is now known as Montana State University-Billings. School was cut short when he joined the US Army in 1959 with his assignment to France. Although it was the height of the Cold War, he drew an assignment with a unit stationed at the intersection of the French, Luxembourg and Belgium borders. In reflection, he felt it was not a 'hardship' assignment.





Upon discharge, he returned to Montana to earn his bachelor's degree at the University of Montana in 1965. He noted his two-wheel transportation during this time was a bicycle. He did mention there was a "...lets ride to Tijuana...." lark but didn't elaborate.

The Peace Corps founded in 1961 was drawing many young Americans to its ranks. Fred volunteered and in 1966 found himself in Northern India on an assignment working to apply small tractors in farming. He chuckles that the models he helped develop were the forerunners of the current day Mahindra line of equipment, one of the largest in the world.

It was also here that he met another Peace Corps volunteer, Susan. With an application from the local Indian jurisdiction, a cake server borrowed from the Ambassador's (Chester Bowles) wife, they were married at the US Embassy in New Delhi.

After completing their Peace Corps commitments, the Reed's returned to the United States and took up graduate studies at the University of North Carolina – Chapel Hill. This was a choice he made because of his fondness for country music, a selection criterion that he occasionally had to minimize in academic circles. This tenure not only lead to a Doctorate in Sociology, but a reuniting with his motorcycle passion. His primary mode of transportation became a Honda Super Hawk 305, although riding two-up took a bit of determination.

A chance meeting with a fellow, a bit raggedy looking marine vet Fred observed, who gave him a ride on his BMW was enough to hook Fred. He knew this was to be his next motorcycle. To fund motorcycling, he and Susan started "Reed and Son Motorcycle Repair" with the nominal shop rate of "Cost plus 10%". His biggest promotion was Dunkin Donuts and free coffee every Sunday. This endeavor lead to a 1968 BMW R60/2, his first BMW. The R60/2 worked its way into the family history.

Rider Profile Fred Reed - (continued)

"Yes, Susan and I have had considerable adventures on BMW's. Our first was a new 1968 R60 that we bought while in graduate school for \$1500. We traded in a Honda Super Hawk 305 for it. That summer we opined that we wouldn't know whether LL Bean was open 24 hours a day unless we went to test them. Much of the current gear was unavailable so we strapped two army back packs together, put them across the dual seat, loaded our LL Bean 3-man tent and zip together sleeping bags on the luggage rack and headed north from Chapel Hill, N.C. We rode north on Highway 11. When we got to Susan's parents' house near Scranton, PA her father exclaimed, "God damn, we haven't had gypsies in the family for five generations." In Freeport MA we found a camp site and visited LL Bean at 3.00 A.M. They were open."

Unfortunately, the R60 met its demise in a head-on crash with a Ford Econoline (Fred was by himself) which left him severely injured. On the bright side, he continued classes, albeit in a full body cast. Not to be deterred, Fred bought one of the first BMW R75/5 models in 1969. Curiously, he had anxieties following the accident, not about riding, but about cars. The motorcycle was his comfort companion.

At the completion of his five-year graduate program, the motorcycle shop was doing quite well, so was the choice to be business or academia? An offer from the University of Chicago to teach development of communication programs in underserved areas overseas solved that question. Fred worked or visited 33 different countries during the three-year assignment.

Following the University of Chicago position was an assignment with UNICEF to develop a communications network in Ethiopia primarily focused on women and children.



The Reed Family returned to Missoula in 1976 to live, or perhaps as their 'base camp', as Fred continued his globetrotting career. His motorcycling continued with a refurbished 1972 BMW R60/5 which he fondly remembers as knowing its way to Syringa, Idaho for huckleberry pie. Rich Gates connected him with a "K" bike for frequent rides to Anacortes, Washington; Tillamook, Oregon and Prince Rupert and several ferry boats rides, once with Gary and Loretta Edwards. The "K" bike took them to Mile Marker "0" twice, once from each side the Continental Divide.

Somehow, he worked in a stint in Indonesia in 1980 for the United Nations. Starting in 1985, he completed a three year assignment with Johns Hopkins University working in India,

developing a health care network.

In 2001, he added a BMW R1100RS to the inventory primarily to do a loop of the U. S. A. with his Los Angeles based brother on his Honda ST1100. This adventure was memorable in several ways. Leaving Missoula May 7th, he soon encountered snow and by Lost Trail Pass, the road was under construction and virtually impassable. When his bike went down at walking speed, the road was too slippery to have enough traction to upright it. Some good Samaritans got it back on its wheels and the passing snowplow spread enough sand to allow him to get off the pass and to dry road. They did the I-10 route, including a tornado, and eventually reached northeast Pennsylvania where Susan linked up with them.

Rider Profile Fred Reed - (continued)

Susan is a frequent passenger with Fred but did try riding on a lowered Suzuki DR-Z650 they purchased from Tom Ferguson. To have a corresponding model, Fred picked up a Kawasaki KLR650. A trip to Lewiston, Idaho is frozen in their minds. They left Missoula on September 10, 2001 and watched the events at the World Trade Center on a flat screen TV that a motorhome camper positioned to the side of his motorhome in a campground on September 11, 2001.

Although Susan has 'retired' from active riding, and Fred appears to be retired. His current ride is a 1989 BMW R100.



Fred gave a 'left-handed' complement to the Motorcycle Safety Foundation. After many years of riding he took the Basic Course in Missoula taught by Larry Banister. His revelation was that he didn't know how he had ridden so long to find out how much he learned in the basic course. Take that as a compliment Mr. Banister.


We hope to see much more of Fred and Susan in the future.

Technical Tips



Recently Don Deuel and I attended the Big As Texas Iron Butt Rally in Texas.

During the same time period IBA was hosting a six day Senior Butt Rally for Finishers of the 11 Day Iron Butt Rally and new riders interested in participating in future rallies at the same venue. During this event three bikes went down from mechanical problems. These include two BMW 1200 GS and a Honda Goldwing! All three had the final drives go out, and couldn't be fixed overnight to get them back into the rally.

What appears to be consistent, was rust was found on the components of the final drives!

All three owners have in the past power washed their bikes, this more than likely forced condensation past the seal into final drive component.

Recommendation, change your final drive fluid at least once or more a year. Check it for signs of condensation. Be cognizant of directly power washing the final drive area! Over time these seals will eventually leak! Even riding on roadways where there are wet conditions can be a problem over time.

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
