### **Mobile Phone Safety**

I frequently see ads on social media, like Facebook, for devices to mount a mobile phone to the handlebars or the dash of a motorcycle. My immediate reaction is that this is a very unsafe and bad idea. Imagine for a minute that a deer jumps out in front of you, there is a collision and you stop in the opposite ditch from where your bike is a 100' away. You have a broken back, may be paralyzed and are moments from passing out. Your phone is attached to your motorcycle and possibly damaged by the collision or has broken free and is unfindable. It is a seldom traveled road and you lay there until you pass out. If you are far enough off the road and so is your bike you may not be found for quite some time, maybe days. My advice, keep your mobile phone on your person, I keep mine in a breast pocket on my jacket for easy access.

An event similar to this actually happened to a friend of mine this summer, a compound fracture and separated from his ATV by about 100 feet. It would have been a very painful crawl back to the ATV further damaging his leg. He says the mobile phone in his pocket saved him a lot of pain and misery.

Ride safe, keep the rubber side down.




have made my task as editor easier and fun. As Forrest Gump would say, "Its like a box of chocolates, you never know what you are going to get"..


## **2019 Christmas Party**


## **2019 Christmas Party**


There were 12 riders who submitted results to Gary. Riders were asked to visit places around the state that were in ten categories and consisted of three mandatory and three optional places to visit in each





## **Reports from the Shop** - Tony Braunreiter



I gave Tony Braunreiter a call recently, to find out about his summer activities. Tony was an active Motorcycle Safety Foundation instructor during the 2019 season. The instructing is over for the season, but he has been busy, with motorcycles. I have paraphrased his emails, and though you might find them interesting.

### **The Editor**

Did too much instructing. Got my fill of that. Am going to do the tournament archery circuit this summer, so I'm not going to teach any more. Sold my RS to a guy from Wisconsin, and bought a

Suzuki DR 650, and plan on doing some dual purpose. Am restoring two Honda TL 250 trials bikes to keep from going nuts. They both are Honda TL250's from 1976. They only made them in '75 and '76 along with 125's. The two stroke European trials bike were lighter and Honda gave up competing with them after those two years, although Sammy Miller, there factory pro did manage one world championship with a highly modified TL. I bought one new in '76 for \$500 and always liked them. Bought both of these from a rancher and his wife from Plains when he had a heart attack and decided to sell the ranch and move to St. George, Utah. They had always been kept in a garage and so had no sun damage to any of the



rubber parts-very important for restoring as they're the hardest to find. I've sourced parts from the US, Canada, and England although they were complete and well maintained so it was just a matter of complete disassembly cleaning and repairing damage, paint, new gaskets and seals, valve lapping and rings. They start on the first kick now. They are done except I'm wait-

ing for a set of side covers for one of them. Both bikes had cracked side covers and I found a guy who commissioned new blanks from Thailand. You still have to prep and paint them. I came up with a fun project over the holiday, and I think it turned out pretty good.



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
