President's Corner - (continued)


I was pleased to have seven club members take advantage of my offer to sign and submit their BMOW MOA mileage contest forms. That tells me it's a helpful service, and one worth continuing in the future. Hopefully more members will be encouraged to submit their MOA mileage form in the future. I don't know why exactly, except it's satisfying to open up that annual issue of the BMW Owners News magazine and see a bunch of familiar names under the Montana column. It's nice to beat other states like Idaho, who only had two riders last year compared to Montana's nine. Again, I don't know why exactly that matters. I suppose it doesn't, really, but it's something to do.

Where to get all those miles, exactly? That might be the question this summer. Like many rally-goers, the cancellation of the BMW MOA National Rally left a void in my June plans. At least they decided to retain Great Falls as the venue and reschedule it to 2021, so we'll get another crack at it next year. Other regional summer rally options are drying up as well. The BMW Riders of Oregon cancelled their Chief Joseph Rally (June). The Bavarian Mountain West Motorcycle Club of Idaho cancelled the Stanley Stomp (August). The Bee Cee Beemers cancelled their Nakusp Hotsprings Rally (August). On the other hand, the Touratech Rally West (June; Plain, WA), the Cascade Country Rendezvous (July; Republic, WA), and Beartooth Rendezvous (August; Red Lodge), and all still seem to be on schedule – for now, anyway.

As for our own club plans for 2020, we'll do our best to minimize the disruption to those, while being smart and responsible about the virus. It's going to take some creativity to define what it means for us to congregate while also social distancing. We had to cancel the annual spring crowd-pleaser, Tech Weekend at the Huddy Outpost, but hope that our generous hosts Kevin and Annie will have an opportunity to invite us back later this year, perhaps clad in scuba gear or Level A hazmat suits. In the meantime, Kevin planned a new riding contest to help ease the loss and keep us busy buzzing around the state.

"This winter was spent puttering in my garage/shop which thanks to my lovely wife is heated. Three projects kept me occupied until the second week of April."

"The first was my venerable Bitsy (R100T) who arrived several years ago in boxes but has served me well over the years but alas, the drive spines for the bevel drive became too thin for any extended use. The repair procedure involves complete disassembly of the drive, removal of the original splines, welding and installation of the hub, and reassembly with new bearings and shims as required. Beyond my ability so off to the expert at Toph Restorations in Medicine Hat, Alberta. Kelly is a very accomplished meticulous machinist and comes highly recommended."

"Second item was my KLR. The swiss army knife of bikes. All that was required was regular maintenance. Change fluids, adjust chain, check the valve clearance. Just an all around good bike."

"Third project was a challenge. Never worked on a Honda before. At some point in the past the PO had welded the gear lever to the shaft. This made it impossible to remove the cover over the drive sprocket and chain for replacement. Out with the Dremel and after several cuts off came the lever. No splines were remaining on the shaft and it had been ground down to a point, thus the welding for repair. Out with the Dremel. I patiently (I don't have any) cut new splines. The new lever slid into place and all was well. Next was a carb rebuild but the kit didn't fit. After checking with local dealer we determined the original carb had been replaced. It seems a Nighthawk and a Rebel are not the same even though they are. One has a 32mm carb and the other has a 35mm carb for performance. All this time I felt a 250 wouldn't pull the skin off a rice pudding but lo and behold, a performance carb. Who knew? The bike has now gone to its owner and she is as pleased as punch."

"That sums up my uneventful winter."



PS. It seems my KLR is not ready. ATTGATT, jumped on, fired her up and away I went for 100 yards, clunk, bang and pushed back to the garage, onto the hoist, on to a voyage of discovery.



Editors Note—Together with the adjacent Gospel Hump Wilderness and surrounding unprotected roadless Forest Service land, it is the core of a 3.3 million acre (13,000 km²) roadless area. It is separated from the Selway-Bitterroot Wilderness, to the north, by a single dirt road (the Magruder Corridor). The wilderness contains parts of several mountain ranges, including the Salmon River Mountains, the Clearwater Mountains, and the Bighorn Crags. The ranges are split by steep canyons of the Middle and Main forks of the Salmon River. The Salmon River is a popular destination for whitewater rafting, and is colloquially known as the "River of No Return" for its swift current and large rapids which make upstream travel difficult.
