


Hello from Northern California (Sacramento area) where we are experiencing our first real winter storm this last week of January. It has been unusually warm and dry, much like Montana this winter. Surprisingly, this is a very cold and quite wet storm. We all know it can snow in MT but here occasionally it will snow as much 8' in one storm on Donner Summit and other passes, that is what has been predicted at least. And since there is so darn much traffic big snowstorms are always a really big problem. And since the water year precipitation to date is only about 1/3 the storm will be welcomed by the thirsty environment and reservoirs.

While I have managed to get in a few motorcycles rides I have not really put on that

What did you do (are you doing) to stay busy during the plague? Annie and I were able to stay moderately busy during the pandemic. We got a few riding trips in and completed our two-year project to modify the shop.

Our riding trips included attending an FJR riders gathering in Red Lodge for a long weekend, a week in Colorado (Black Canyon of the Gunnison, NP) and later attending the Cedar City, UT BMWMOA Getaway. More on the rides perhaps in the future, but our most significant accomplishment was modifying the shop to make more of the interior usable.

Some of you will remember that about half of the space in the shop was unheated and had a gravel floor. Our plan was to place concrete in the 1,100 sq-ft unheated area, build a 375 sq-ft loft for storage and finally, enclose, insulate and heat the area under the loft. The concrete was poured placed by a in April, 2019 by a construction company superintendent who bought a used lawn mower from us and offered to give me a bit of a deal on the job. The concrete was in place for Tech Day 2019 when this picture was taken by our resident talented photographer, **Ed Field**.





In June, I built the loft with assistance from **Annie** and a friend from Alaska who thought he was passing through and staying only a day. Ten days and many sore muscles later he knew all too well that he made a mistake. Here the loft is framed and needing only the flooring and railings. My friend cut the stair stringers and did a fantastic job.

Here, the finished loft is waiting to be filled with our treasured junk.


Finally, the finished product painted and with a sliding door built and hung. The old tire changer will be heading north of the border when the border is once again open.



In the spring of 2020 enclosing the space under the loft began. Not until I got to this stage did it occur to me that I could fit the large lift in the new heated space so that I can work on the sidecars, riding mowers and ATV in the heated space. Had I planned to do it earlier in the process I would have made the large opening into the space a few inches wider. The Urals will fit but require great care in getting them through the door.

My son-in-law helped with the insulation (by far the most miserable part of the project). I wired the ceiling for lighting and fortunately no smoke was released into the atmosphere. I sought professional help to install a 220v heater and club member **Blair Krumm**, who is a pro, did the work.





The shop is ready for another TECH DAY, and we sure hope we can hold it this year!

The BMW MOA is excited to announce a new riding event for 2021 open only to MOA members: The Grand Coddiwomple!

What is a coddiwomple, you ask? Well, the word coddiwomple means to "travel in a purposeful manner toward a vaque destination." So, "The Grand Coddiwomple" is a large-scale scavenger hunt created to give MOA members opportunities to ride their motorcycles while searching for specific items in order to accumulate points, receive recognition and have loads of fun! Basically, you get to ride your bike to various physical locations called "Challenges," then provide proof you were there by taking a photo of your bike, the Challenge location, and your individually numbered Grand Coddiwomple flag. Each Challenge carries a point value and while some you can only complete once, others have no limit.


Riders can earn Completion status relatively easily, even with limited riding time, though accumulating many points or even winning is of course more challenging.

Riders will only need 300 points to complete The Grand Coddiwomple, which will not only earn you bragging rights and a Certificate of Completion suitable for framing, but also a commemorative pin. Riders can go well beyond 300 points, and the rider with the highest point total will be named the winner and receive a special award of recognition. There will also be prize pools for those with the highest point totals. See the Sections 12 and 13 in the Rules document for details. Though there is a competitive element anytime a score is kept and there will be some drawings, The Grand Coddiwomple is not just about competition or prizes. Rather, it's about all the places you will go and the fun things you will do that you may not have done otherwise. Participating riders will get to choose their own Challenges to complete, plan their own routes and set their own schedule. The purpose of The Grand Coddiwomple is to have fun riding your motorcycle!

Once you register, you will receive your uniquely numbered 2021 Coddiwomple flag and a sticker. As described in the

rules, for most Challenges you will need to take a picture of the Challenge object with your bike and your flag clearly displayed. You will then post your pictures on a photo sharing site and email a link to the photo with a description of the Challenge you are claiming.

The Challenges will get you traveling, but some will also require some thought and creativity. This year the overall theme is based on the slogan and location of the 2021 BMW MOA Rally in Great Falls, Montana. The "Gold, Saddle Up and Ride Challenge" will earn you 200 points by spelling out the words "SADDLE UP AND RIDE" using the first letter of different place names. Another Challenge worth 50 points each requires a photo of a place name which includes the word "Falls." Riders can also earn 50 points by somehow depicting the phrase, "Falling in Love!"

Grand Coddiwomple rules and Challenges are fully spelled out on the Coddiwomple registration website at *bmwmoa.org/coddiwomple*. This event runs from April 1, 2021, through October 31, 2021, with registration opening on February 2, 2021. Participation is limited to the first 1,000 entrants, so register early to ensure your place and to receive your flag by the April 1 start date.

Have fun planning your ride and riding your plan! It's The Grand Coddiwomple!



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Fire Lookout Challenge



GIRD POINT LOOKOUT

Built in 1939 on the south summit, this 10' pole tower with L-4 cab was staffed into the 1980's. It was completely surrounded by the Gird Point Fire in 1990. Available on the Recreation Rental program, it is listed on the National Historic Lookout Register. Bitterroot National Forest, 12 miles ESE of Hamilton in Ravalli County, Montana, Elevation 7702'.




Three Wheeler Corner

Why are sidecars called hacks?

Sidecars earned the nickname "hack" thanks to a village near London called Hackney. Hackney was the birthplace of a particular breed of horse that was used to give rides in the growing metropolitan landscape during the 17th century. The year 1621 was the first year that a horse-drawn carriage was referred to as a "hackney coach" or a "hackney carriage". Much later, during the Industrial Revolution, taxicabs kept being referred to as "hackney carriages," even though electric and industrial combustion engine-powered carriages started to replace their horse-drawn counterparts. The influence of the term is so widespread that even to this day, in Boston, the medallion a taxi operator receives is known as a "Hackney Carriage" medallion. So, once sidecars were introduced and could carry passengers, calling them "hacks" was only natural.

Meet **Al Murry**, from Helena. You may remember Al from the September meeting in Ennis and riding his 1999 BMW R1100RT. Originally from Baltimore, he grew up near Chicago and moving to Montana 25 years ago. Al starting riding motorcycles as a teenager, which continued until family responsibilities took precedence. A long hiatus until the children reached adulthood, and he got back into riding with a 2001 BMW G650GS. Al, a practicing accountant, still had some slack in his motorcycle budget, and found the 1999 BMW R1100RT we saw in Ennis. One of his favorite rides of the year, the Lincoln Loop, with **Mark Elizey** and **Paul Smietanka** in the autumn as the trees were in full color. Lincoln Road over Flesher Pass, through Lincoln, to

Helmville, and then down twisty Hwy 271 to Drummond and back to Helena via I-90 & Hwy 12. Always a fun ride.



Meet new member **Mark Bray**, Fairview, Montana who has the distinction of being the club member the furthest east, and still in Montana. Mark, who works in North Dakota, says he has about a four block walk to the border and then a short stroll to work. A direct ride to Fairview from Missoula is about 600 miles.

Originally from Missouri, and a small farm east of Kansas City where, as he puts it, they raised rocks and rattle snakes. When Mark was about 12-13 years old, his father bought a Suzuki 80 cc two cycle motorcycle. Its most endearing characteristic was the motor could run both directions, so releasing the clutch in first gear was always approached with a

bit of caution. The good part was, the farm gave him all the space a rambunctious kid needed to perfect his riding skills, that is a far as a cow pasture would allow.

Mark recalls he did ride while in high school and tried his luck at moto crossing. It soon became apparent, money, or the absence there of was the controlling factor in pursuing that venue. He had a long hiatus in riding while pursuing his lifetime work of distributing welded steel rails, manufactured in St. Louis, to railroads in Montana. A project, and a young lady in Havre, Montana led him to become a permanent state resident. He took a break from riding as he got on with his life, until he bought a 2003 Harley-Davidson. Unfortunately, the Harley met its demise in a wreck that also sidelined Mark's riding. He began riding again after acquiring a BMW K1200S, which carried him along the Beartooth highway several times as well as the Going-to-the-Sun highway several times. In anticipation eastern Montana, locally

referred to as "West Dakota", would develop some off-road riding Mark invested in a 2009 BMW1200GS with 18,000 miles. He laments that in two years, he has only ridden it 2,000 miles, but is looking forward to bringing it west to participate in some club events in 2021.

I asked Mark about the closest dealership or repair shop. He said he just picked up his GS from Sturgis Motorsports, Sturgis, South Dakota, 300 miles south. He purchased his BMW's from a dealer in Kansas City, Missouri about 1,000 miles southeast of Fairview. The red bike is his old F800GS and the silver one is a K1200S. He missed the K1200S so much, he bought a K1600GT. The red F800GS photo was taken in the Bear's Paw mountains south of Havre.

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Dirt Biking big Bikes in Southern Utah



You may remember **Jared Beaird**, an occasional participant in our First Saturday Breakfast events, and who organized a ride in Death Valley National Park in April 2020. Several of the MONTANA BMW RIDERS Club members participated. Jared, in conjunction with Maverick Motors, is organizing a similar ride in southern Utah, for March 22-28 of this year. Jared sent the following email:



According to the PO, I'm the 3rd owner of this single-spark 5-speed oilhead since its retirement from the Oregon State Police. Acquired in 2011 with 98,274 miles; current mileage is 122,795. A 3-ring binder of all my maintenance records comes with the bike. The few repairs were done by either John Munch's Motorcycle Werks or Big Sky Motorsports. I'm parting ways with this sexy beast because logic has defeated passion: I enjoy my R1200GSA too much, and I need garage space for a bike lift.





The police model has the standard R1100RT stuff (heated grips; power windshield; ABS) but is better in several wonderful ways: 1) glorious spoked wheels; 2) 18" front wheel versus the standard 17" (ride up over curbs in pursuit of miscreants); 3) integrated locked radio box in lieu of a rear seat (no passengers); 4) European switchgear and lighting settings - on/off/running; 5) precision speedometer; 6) BMW Comfort Seat ('comfort' meh, but it is wide); 7) 50-amp alternator; and 8) special front subframe w/ hardpoints. Upgrades/FARKLE's include: handlebar barbacks; LED driving lights; and AF-XiED O2 sensor manipulator to fine tune the air/fuel mixture. Comes with side cases, the original police light bar (though it doesn't fit over standard cases), plus a can of miscellaneous bits and pieces.

I have for sale a 2007 F650GS. This motorcycle was purchased from Annie and Kevin Huddy in the Fall of 2017. Approximately 21,500 miles. I don't have the actual mileage as I write this. It's in the back of my garage, covered, with a few other motorcycles I seldom ride - those of you who have seen my "fleet" will understand - and would require me to move about four or five bikes to access it, but 21,500 is an accurate estimate.

Brenda bought the motorcycle after having completed both the Basic Rider Course, and the Advanced Rider Course. At the time she had previously ridden only as a passenger. She is one of those people you occasionally encounter who are a natural; she rides intuitively well, and she did great in both classes, especially the ARC. Some very experienced riders in the ARC commented that they were surprised she was a new rider. Annie Huddy was not using her F650GS and offered to sell it to Brenda.

Brenda rides it quite proficiently, but has ridden the bike very little. She frankly does not enjoy riding on the street in today's traffic environment, so has decided to sell it.

The Huddy's purchased the motorcycle new when they were living in Fairbanks. It has many functional additions, nicely and sanely equipped as one would expect of a motorcycle owned by them. It has the "Low Frame Option", BMW "Premium Package", ABS, center stand, Jesse bags, Corbin saddle, aftermarket windscreen, aux lighting, engine/ radiator/center stand protection, hand guards, heated grips, etc. These are but a few of the additions that sold us on buying the motorcycle. It literally required me to do nothing to make it into a competent travelling machine. In keep-ing with the previous owner's meticulous record keeping, there is a 2-1/2 inch thick (I measured it - grin) 3-ring binder, well organized with records of all the additional equipment, and maintenance records. There are no mechanical issues; the bike is in good condition, needs nothing.

Brenda paid \$5,200 for it, and would sell it for \$4,750, which I believe is a reasonable and fair price, especially considering the bike's history, low miles, and how well it's equipped.


