
With the pandemic fading off, it feels as if we have apexed the corner, are coming out of the lean and rolling on the



It is summer, C'MON LET'S RIDE!









Reports from the Road - Marrea Matthews



Meet **Stephen Sullivan** from Whitefish, Montana. Stephen found out about the MONTANA BMW RIDERS from his high school friend and long-time fellow dirt bike rider, **Steve Inabnit**. Stephen was born and raised in Missoula where he received his primary and secondary schooling and earned a degree from the University of Montana. He followed that with a paralegal degree and then followed a career that specialized in construction claims resolution and analysis.

He started riding at 13 years old on a Honda 50, and then progressed to competing in motocross on dirt tracks in Western Montana. His bike for

this endeavor was a Husky CR250 and later a Suzuki RM370. He lamented the MX track in Missoula has long since been replaced by commercial buildings.

One of Stephen favorite types of riding is single track trails & dirt roads on his dirt bike, a 2021 Beta 390, with the Pipestone riding area as one of his favorite destinations. For the last 10 years Steve has operated *Great Divide Dual Sport Adventures* – a adventure bike guide operation that specializes in guiding adventure riders along the Continental Divide. Steve's guide bike is a 2021 KTM 890R. From the appearance of his garage, we should not be lulled into believing riding the dirt is his only riding. Meet **Marrea Mathews** currently living in Corvallis, Montana. Marrea, originally from Kentucky, 'found' the Bitterroot Valley in 2010 on the solo leg of a long-distance ride to the west coast. Marrea, along with four other female riders (and one tag-along husband) made the ride from Frankfort, Kentucky to a Motormaids⁽¹⁾ (https://www.motormaidsinc.org/) rally in Cody, Wyoming. While the rest of the group took a more direct route home, Marrea turned the ride into a solo event to the west coast. The return route included Highway 12 over Lolo Pass. At its junction with Highway 93, of the two choices, north to

Missoula and south to Hamilton, she chooses south. It was fortunate turn of fate. She passed through Hamilton, on through Darby and followed the West Fork of the Bitterroot, over the Montana-Idaho divide to Horse Creek Hot Springs. She vowed to return to the Bitterroot Valley, which she did in 2012.

As a mid-aged birthday present to herself, along with retirement, she took her first MOTOTCYCLE SAFETY FOUNDATION course and earned the endorsement on her driver's license. Then came a 1980 Yamaha 650 Special, most memorable for its low output charging system. Stops, for any reason required maintaining high revs to ensure the motor would not stop, and then not enough battery to restart. She remembers getting looks for the male drivers which unspoken, indicated some skepticism of her riding ability. She remembers coasting it into the garage when the motor stopped at the top of the driveway.

Marrea solved the generator charging problem by trading the Yamaha in on a Suzuki Boulevard. Marrea found a way to combine her bicycling interests with her motorcycling passion, as you can see from the nearby photo. Although the Suzuki advanced her riding skills, the 'feet forward' riding position was not her style. The Boulevard was replaced by her current ride, a 2005 BMW F650GS, with 20,000 miles on the odometer. It now has 60,000 miles to its credit.

Although Marrea has many pavement miles under her belt, she is equally adept on, and prefers dirt roads and camping.



Moab Adventure Immersion Training May 2021 - Rebecca Coursey

Having purchased my BMW F750GS in May 2019 with the hopes of riding more dirt to get to the places of beauty, camping and the quiet that I enjoy, and not really feeling comfortable yet riding dirt or trail, I signed up for an Adventure Riding Training Immersion through MotoDiscovery. This "camp" included five full days of riding with training exercises, six nights of hotel, all meals, sag wagon help, and meeting other motorcyclists. MotoDiscovery is a 5-star outfit, founded by Skip Mascarro. All details from registration to hotel rooms to the man, Barak Naggan, who was our teacher, to the rental bike for me — a Yamaha XT250—were seamlessly coordinated, expert and fun. For me with no dirt bike training, this was a perfect way to begin.

For this trip, I rode my BMW F750GS from Bozeman to Moab, camping along the Hoback River one night, then Steinaker State Park north of Vernal the second night. I missed the Highway 191 South turnoff in Duchesne, and ended up in Heber City, basically added 210 extra miles and having to go

through Provo and Orem—not fun. I did not arrive early to the hotel for the first night as planned. Indeed, the wind was so strong along I-70 that I was leaning the bike over and in terror, so doing everything wrong by bracing against the wind. I nearly quit along I-70, called Barak to explain why I would not be there on time, and was basically in tears by then. After electrolyte drinks, having problems turning my bike around in dirt, and dreading more wind, I somehow pulled myself together and made it to Moab about an hour after the initial meeting — but in time for dinner!

Some of the highlights of the trip were staying at Scott and Julie's 3-Step Hideaway near La Sal Junction, south of Mo-

ab. Exceptional meals, great western appeal with cabins, super wonderful people. Scott has a shop (the Livery) that would be the envy of most of us. They are also building a very large air circulating green house with grill. They just hosted one of the BMW dirt training sessions last week. It's very western frontier style. We trained in the "paddock" learning to better balance the bike, stand on pegs, do counterbalance turns all standing up, many braking exercises and some skidding exercises. This was all new to me. In the afternoon we went for a trail ride that usually had an exercise on it. The second afternoon that meant going down a steep rocky hill, crossing a small sand arroyo and up another steep rocky hill, then turning around in this sandy loom stuff that was really challenging for me. I "took out" a few sage brush when I finally couldn't make the bike turn, and that wasn't just once!

Then on Day 3 we rode through Montezuma Canyon, seeing a very neat adobe home built into a canyon wall, like the Anazazi (*Editor's note: also spelled Anasazi – meaning "Ancient Ones" – thought to be ancestors of the modern Pueblo Indians*) did, and a kiva (*Editor's note: a room used by Puebloans for rites and political meetings*) that is being explored archaeologically. The canyon itself was all dirt, beautiful and had a huge mud water we crossed! There were sections of dirt and fun riding, sections of endless fresh gravel that terrorized me (but I finally stopped trying to control the bike and learned to lighten the death grip on the handlebars and then it was kinda fun) and yes, my old friend, wind. Oh, a few trucks that didn't

seem to care and wanted the full road, and the switchbacks. Both uphill and downhill. A few of the riders went down on a few of the 10% grade switchbacks going downhill. I just slowed way down. Much easier standing on pegs and taking it in first gear! Counter-steering learned with knee deep in the tank.

That took us to Cortez, Colorado for another day of training near Delores, Colorado, and an amazingly fun and beautiful ride along a small portion of the Colo-

rado BDR (Backcountry Discovery Route). The final day we had a 220-mile ride back to Moab, we tried to go over a pass, but the snow

turned us around (I felt right at home and laughed, so did the other

two Montana rider participants) and along with the notorious headwind, I made it back to the hotel, turned in my Yamaha XT250, and looked at how huge my 750 is!

The ride home was epic. Left Moab in pouring rain, (It rains in the desert?). I mean-- pouring drenching slicing rain with wind. The 40 some or 60 some miles from Moab to I-70 was one of the nightmare memories of my riding experience. I was packed too heavy on top. I hadn't put on

full rain gear. It was hard to see. Lots of cars. At the I-70 junction there was a road-side stop under a huge cotton-wood tree. I put on rain gear. I repacked. And finally headed west on I-70. At least the wind and rain had settled down some, but it was not fun. By Price, Utah and going north on Highway 191, the wind kept up a solid challenge, but the rain had mostly stopped. I once again camped outside of Vernal. That's a great State Park, by the way. Hot showers. Nice spots. Even for bikes with tents.

Then, checking out as much of the weather map (actually the night before, luckily because then in all the rain and wind I just didn't plug in my phone and it was dead), when the weather broke on Saturday morning (after more drenching rain at the State Park that night), I realized that I better head to Bozeman directly.

Moab Adventure Immersion Training May 2021 - Rebecca Coursey

Made it home, 488 miles, in one single 10.5-hour day of riding. Coming through Gallatin Canyon was a wicked 34 degrees, but no rain. Snow along the road, but pavement basically clean. The hardest wind was in Pinedale, WY with a huge storm backing up against the Wind River Range. I really was holding up my bike at the gas station while trying to fill it with gas in Pinedale. By then, with phone working, I could see that Teton Pass looked nice enough, Bozeman had some sunshine, and the best bet was to push on.

Overall, it was around 2200 miles of motorcycle riding, including the riding with the rental bike. I learned so much, and I never once dropped the bike. I was the only person (the one woman along with 6 other male participants) who

never went down. I was prudently careful, explored exercises but stayed within my limits, and riding alone, I've learned to check and re-check myself. There were a few exercises I chose not to do when it felt "too much". It was not all fun, however the riding on the BDR trail and other parts, were fantastic riding. I'd do it again in a heartbeat and have already signed up to do the Idaho BDR in July.

Now I'm looking for a Yamaha XT250 or I might try out one of the new Himalayans by Royal Enfield. While I thought I



would ride the 750GS on all of this dirt, it feels large to me and more than I can pick up by myself. I might try the BMW 310. The end result though is that I'm a much better rider, I had a really great vacation, so enjoyed MotoDiscovery and the group, and am dreaming about doing more riding and buying another motorcycle.


