All roads lead somewhere, and if my Rand McNally Road atlas can be trusted, bunches of interesting-looking routes connect Montana to Louisiana. I've enjoyed the time we've spent together, and I look forward to seeing you again – here, there, or somewhere in between.

Since the National Rally I have been busy with company and camping trips so no real motorcycle adventures to report from here, haven't been on the bike since I got back from Great Falls. Darn, oh well, such is life.

I was pleased to see a pair of women riders from my Sacramento club the, River City Beemers, placed 1st and 2nd in the BMWMOA mileage contest, Brenda Gay with 21,615 miles and Laura Strom Musgrave with 14,842 miles. Wonderful to see women so involved in riding and the club. Unfortunately, news has come that Laura was in an accident in southern Utah returning from Paonia and lost her life. Details of the accident are sketchy so I will not share what I don't know for sure. She was an admired and solid member of the RCB and much loved by her family and friends.

One thing that has been reinforced in my mind from the accident is the importance of keeping your mobile phone on your person. It was reported her bike was severely damaged and caught fire. Her riding companions (I feel very bad for them, they will never be able to unsee the accident) knew her number so the UHP called it to find the phone to call her "in case of emergency" numbers. Had UHP not been able to call the phone it may have never been found and much harder and slower to contact family. This contact would be even more important for a badly injured unconscious survivor to get family contacted.

Two summers past another fellow I know was badly injured in ATV accident and unable to get back to his ATV. Thankfully he had his phone in his pocket and help was soon on the way. Had he not he would have suffered quite some time before someone missed him. I don't get mounting a lifeline like a phone to the motorcycle and risking not being able to contact help. I wish at times I had a satellite phone for hunting and riding in poor service areas.

I know I don't need to preach safety to this group but wanted to relate these two incidents for your information.

While this is rather old news from the BMWMOA website I don't recall seeing it before, so I wanted to share it as a good reminder of the importance of the BMWMOA foundation.

The BMW MOA Foundation launched an aggressive fundraising campaign at the 2019 Scoot Boot 'n Boogie with a goal of creating a million-dollar endowment to fund the future of rider safety, education and training. Foundation President Chuck Manley said donations to the <u>SAFEMILES ENDOWMENT</u> will be specifically reserved for the purpose of creating a long-term endowment to guarantee future Foundation initiatives.

"Our first raffle effort was nearly ten years ago, and the Foundation has used those funds to provide important rider safety initiatives like our Paul B. Scholarship program," Manley said. "If we had started the SafeMiles Endowment at the same time, we would have a \$1 million nest egg today to fund our training efforts forever."

Manley also said the Foundation is looking for donors at all levels, including a handful of key donors willing to make an annual commitment to the SafeMiles Endowment. "Fifteen MOA members have stepped up and committed long term donations to get the fund off the ground," said Manley. "We have commitments for \$150,000 in donations toward the million-dollar goal, but we've tried to make it very easy for MOA members to donate at any level."

Donors to the SafeMiles Endowment can receive Foundation incentives such as saddlebag medallions, Foundation polo shirts, one-year membership renewals and even automatic entries for Foundation raffles. To learn more about the SafeMiles Endowment and the various options for giving, MOA members can visit BMWMOAF.ORG.

"Our \$250 donation level was very popular at the rally because it includes automatic entry into the various Foundation raffles, a one-year membership renewal and several other incentives that MOA members deserve," commented Manley.

With the announcement of the SafeMiles campaign and the ability to automatically enter Foundation raffles, the Foundation also unveiled two custom R nine T Urban GSs that will be the prizes in the fall Custom Bike raffle. SafeMiles donors can receive an automatic entry to the Fall raffle as well as next year's Completely Vintage raffle and the 2020 Superstakes by donating now at SAFEMILES ENDOWMENT DONATION PAGE.

"It is a very exciting time for the Foundation with lots of activity," said Manley, "but, I am especially excited for future BMW MOA members who will benefit from these efforts."



BMW US is now into stealth promos. It would be near impossible for me to miss the release that BMW moto US finally launched a variation of Ultimate Care, but I didn't miss it, because they haven't promoted it.

I've been suggesting for years for BMW to follow the success of their US auto division and offer the Ultimate Care program. I've mentioned it on MOTO as well, not only in the last issue but also in Issue 100, and in previous discussions about BMW and Ducati. Ultimate Care is complimentary maintenance for life of warranty. BMW's moto division stealthily released a variation of this program just around the time of MOTO's last issue, however, it differs from the car side. The motorcycle's Ultimate Care is prepaid maintenance packages offered to owners of new motorcycles.

In addition to the above BMW offered something that is interesting, also part of their new stealth promo strategy. There is now an option to buy up to 4 years of extended factory warranty. You can theoretically have 7 years of warranty on your newish Beemer. Both programs are offered directly through dealers. You heard it here first.












Somewhere in the Missouri Breaks region—school or church?

So, following Noraly's example of off-road

adventure riding, a few of us set off for an adventure day-ride on dirt. And though we didn't have a sag wagon like 'the pretenders', there were five of us together to support each other; Robert Carpenter, Bill Clark, Larry Banister, myself, Chuck Reaves, and a new member/rider from Bozeman, all around good guy, Mike Allen. Admittedly this was a road that's been ridden before...so it wasn't one of those adventure rides that has you breaking out in a sweat because you're not sure of what's ahead. Though this ride might not be rated as a true adventure trek; when you're out 'there' you never know when an adventure might start!

Our route was the Jocko Canyon Road, an excellent Winnebago Road; defined by our favorite, Dick French, "If a Winnebago can travel on it, my motorbike and I can too"! This day the route was to be ridden from west to east, beginning off Highway 93 at Arlee, Montana with the terminus 34 miles away on Highway 83 just east of Placid Lake. Lovely road, great scenery with mountains, streams, lakes and panoramic vistas of the Rattlesnake



Mountains, the Mission Mountains and the Swan Range...and did I mention it was a Winnebago road?

This was ridden in an afternoon in the middle of June this year. The weather was gorgeous; just what you want to see for riding weather in summer. Temps were in the 80's, lots of blue sky and a few puffy white clouds; none of the 100 degree temps or the smoke that inundate our valleys now.



Chuck and Mike Allen were late showing up at the Wye north of Missoula (what's new?). Mike had to have a new rear tire installed before the ride. Luckily Big Sky Motorsports took the emergency into consideration and changed the tire on short notice.

So now spooled up and running north on Highway 93 we turned onto the Jocko Canyon Road at Arlee. We spread out single file to minimize dust. After getting to the one confusing turn on the route, several of us huddled to pore over a Forest Service map...you know, those paper things? Thankfully, as per what had happened two years ago, a local happened along and pointed us in the right direction. (Those locals turn out to be the best kind of maps).

So, at this point why would anyone want Chuck to lead? He's late, he can't find the turn, he goes too slow and stops too often to take pictures and pass water. But the guys remember Chuck telling them about the ride two years ago (same route) when with Chuck in the lead a <u>HUGE</u> black bear crossed the road about 75 yards in front of the group. You won't believe this, but lighting was about to strike a second time truly making this an adventure ride even Noraly would be proud of. About 7-10 miles in, as we approached a wooden bridge with a slight incline above the road level, a <u>HUGE</u> black bear crossed the road 30 yards in front of me on the other side of the bridge. The bear was going right to left as I was approaching at 30 mph. I was gaining on the bear rapidly, in fact so rapidly I thought..."I better slow down". So, here's an adventure question for you...."on gravel to slow down quickly what brake do you grab"? If you stayed with the grab idea and especially if you said grab the front brake...remember...on gravel...that's the wrong an-

swer. My front wheel starts to go 90 degrees out of my travel path and all of a sudden, I see the headline..."Biker trapped under motorcycle, eaten by bear!" So, I quickly let off that darn front brake and saved the Missoulian having to cover that scenario. By the time I was able to stop on the bridge the bear had disappeared into the underbrush. After checking to make sure no cubs were left behind, the adventure ride continued. Because of the dust and our being strung out, there were only a couple riders that did see the bear, so I do have witnesses. The others that didn't see the bear just thought my bike had been stabbed in absentia, by a voodoo witch doctor the way it jumped all over the road. Anyway no crash, no harm...except after the ride, when we're in Potomac relaxing at *Culley's* over a burger, I had the sneaking suspicion maybe those guys wanted me in the lead.... for a reason....one I'd not thought of. Hey guys????

So don't be late and don't botch the navigation and for sure don't grab the front brake on gravel.

July Meeting - Phillipsburg





Reports from the Road - John DiBari



We will also hit up some trails after the meeting.




