President's Corner



Greetings from your southern agent in Hurricane Country. Greetings from the Outpost! With more than a little regret we once again feel compelled to cancel the TechDay that was scheduled for late September. The resurgence of the COVID virus makes it unwise for us to host such a gathering for the foreseeable future. We are, however, committed to continuing the tradition of hosting an annual TechDay here at the Outpost and are hopeful we will be able to do so in May 2022. We hope those of you who attended the Beartooth Rendezvous had a great time. We intended to attend, but it did not happen. We planned to take a ride around Montana, Wyoming and Idaho for nine days prior to making our way to Red Lodge. We did meander around hitting Red Lodge, Cody, the Big Horn Mountains, Wind River, Grand Tetons NP, the Klim HQ

and store in ID and even an early morning ride through Yellowstone NP. We camped except for a couple of nights, but then the rain started. We spent the night before the rally in Red Lodge with much of our gear wet and awoke to rain with a forecast of more to come. We cowered in the face of adversity and headed home. We spent two days riding in the Bighorn Mountains and rode most of the roads twice. It really is a very different experience riding the Shell Canyon Road down than it is riding it up. We also made our first ride through the Wind River Reservation in central Wyoming then made our way through the Tetons to the Klim HQ/ Store in Rigby, Idaho. It was Annie's birthday, and she did very well at the store.

We met some interesting people along the way as well. Sturgis was winding down so the campgrounds had more than a few Harley folks headed home. There was the farmer from lowa riding two-up with his wife. They had trailered their bike to the rally but decided to leave their RV in Sturgis to take a ride to Cody and camp. Top Tip: don't wait to put your tent up for the very first time as it is getting dark and starting to sprinkle. Another Sturgis evacuee was a rancher from the Lewistown area that had just sold his ranch. The buyers don't want to run the ranch, so they hired the owner to stay on and manage things. I looked up the ranch and found the sale listing online. The asking price was \$19.5 million so I guess he could afford a bike trip..... There was the guy in his 30's just south of the Wind River gorge who struck up a conversation with us at a McDonalds. He roams around the country in his pick-up sleeping in it every night. He said his alarm clock is normally a tap on his window made by a Deputy's flashlight telling him he needs to move on. And finally, the couple from lowa that have a farm where they raise mostly corn. They had just left a relative's farm in Idaho who was going to try growing corn for the first time. 

Reports from the Road - Rebecca Coursey

Rebecca Coursey, from Bozeman, recently joined the MONTANA BMW RIDERS and has focused on off-road riding. Earlier this year, she completed an Adventure Immersion Training course in MOAB (June Issue of the Newsletter); completed the off-road riding course in conjunction with the BMW MOA Rally in Great Falls; and recently participated in the WEST38MOTO Idaho BDR (Backcountry Discovery Route) tour. The intent of the tour was to follow the Idaho BDR shown in the Butler Motorcycle Maps, but due to forest fires, many of the BDR roads were closed. The tour guides improvised, following roads that were available, and on Day 6 completed the tour in Bovill, Idaho. Rebecca branched off from the group at Bovill, Idaho and made her way back to Missoula, the starting point of her tour. The track maps in the article are essentially correct for the overall route but are missing some of the details in the side roads and trails used to meet the intent of a BDR experience.

Rebecca is sharing her experiences in the following article.

This was a great trip on my new Yamaha XT250, 1682 miles for me on this bike. It encompassed riding on basic good roads, like HWY 12 over Lolo Pass and along the Lochsa, to I-90 over Lookout Pass (unplanned due to fires), forest service dirt roads, freshly graveled roads, and a lot of fun ATV type of tracks with rocks, gullies, and countless

switchbacks. This trip had one river crossing, which I did with some help! I fell in love with this XT250, really surprised at how capable this bike is, even compared with the big twin 1200 and 1250's. There were 12 participants, two leaders, and two support people helping with cooking and carrying gear during the day that we didn't need. We had five nights of camping, and two hotel nights. Great trip, too hot at times, and the fires required some

re-routing. About 850 miles dirt. I'm gaining skills for sure!




I owe some big thank you's for this trip. Maverick Motorsports in Missoula was gracious to help unloading and loading my bike from the truck (I drove it over in the truck from Bozeman to Missoula to spare myself some freeway miles). Huge thankyou to Richard French, who picked me up from Maverick, helped me pack the XT250, stored my truck at his home, and routed me through the most beautiful road, with lunch included, from Missoula to Lolo. And helped again when I returned to Missoula. Another huge shout-out goes to <u>Dustin Wessels</u> and <u>Cassie Maier</u> of West 38 Moto. Both are exceptional leaders, experienced motorcyclists, and totally fun, alive and exciting fellow human beings riding and evolving in their own lives.

I began riding from Missoula, spent the first night camping at Wilderness Gateway along the Lochsa. Second night spent along the Salmon River at Spring Creek (?) campground. It was Hot. Not too smokey. Swimming was great! The fires were burning in the West Lolo Complex for going over Lolo Pass, and the Dixie Fire south of Elk City was gaining

ground.

From there I made it to Boise, where I met the group and began the ID-BDR ride with West38Moto. The trip out of Boise—headed to Pine —began innocently enough, with some basic gravelgood-dirt, but within miles, we were climbing up a truly technical dirt road with ruts and rocks in 103 degrees weather. A peer rider got stuck in a rut about 5 feet deep, I passed, praying to not go down (RPMs and momentum are your friend!) and later another rider went off in a rocky section. It's the first time I have seen a bike off the side of a road, upside down, scrambled up in bushes. The guys turned her around, and to my amazement, Dusty Wessels rode that bike up at an oblique slant as if he were basically riding a nice dirt road. Inwardly I thought — "OK Dusty, no questions asked, I'm in!"





Along the trip there were a thousand plus switchbacks, loose gravel, rocky sections, almost all two-track jeep and ATV roads, and some basic forest service roads. There were mishaps along the way, so adventure was part of it. On day 3, I went down softly in a left-hand uphill switchback turn, decreasing radius, stalled the bike. Duh, forgot about the clutch! Cassie helped me pick the bike up. Gratitude. I had been having problems turning in that direction and how I weight the inside peg but freeze my arms. This fall helped me understand what I was doing and begin corrections. Other riders went down as well, with another rider going off the steep bank along a downhill hairpin turn. An epic rescue effort by five of the guys in the group. No one was hurt, motorcycle un-

scratched. However awakening understanding of why we ride with an In-Reach and with another person or more. On day four we split the group. The more advanced riders went with Dusty across the Magruder road to Darby, and others went over White Bird Hill and along Hwy 12, over Lolo Pass. We spent a night in Lolo that was unplanned due to fires. We were unable to ride the Lolo Motorway. Then we headed north over Lookout Pass and into the Pritchard area north of Wallace. That was great riding. Swimming. Camping. And just plain fun getting to know the other participants as we celebrated our experiences. I returned home after the group dispersed going over Thompson Pass (what a great artesian spring!) and swam mid-hot-day in the Clark Fork outside of Thompson Falls. Got back to Missoula, Richard helped me, and got in the truck, turned on Grateful Dead tunes, and back to Bozeman. Now the Yamaha XT250, named "Xena T Dirt Road Warrior", sits in a very special place on the patio out the back door. She's known to be practicing her tight-radius turns around the apple tree and flower beds in the backyard.

New Member - Chadmon (Chad) Householder



Meet **Chadmon "Chad" Householder** from Missoula, Montana. Originally from Noblesville, IN just north of Indianapolis, he professes to be an addicted but "average-at-best" fly fisherman. A few years after graduating from DePauw University in Greencastle, IN, Chad moved to Boise, Idaho in 1995 and decided to add another activity to his leisure pursuits. A motorbike seemed to be just the answer to tear up the twisty roads surrounding the Boise area. Not having ridden before, he took the Idaho STAR (Skill Training Advantage for Riders) Motorcycle Safety Program and passed with flying colors. With a license endorsement in hand, he was ready to ride, but needed a motorbike. A 1991 red BMW K75s was soon found and purchased. Although he never rode extensively, many miles were spent touring around Idaho, as well as a trip to Crater Lake and the California coast.

The "K" bike served its purpose, and was sold it to a friend, after Chad moving to Missoula in 2016 from Sidney, Nebraska, where he was working for Cabela's HQ. It was several years before the "K" bike was replaced by a 2002 silver BMW R1150GS in April 2021. It now resides next to his frequently used drift boat and raft. As a contractor working for the U. S. Department of Agriculture in IT applications project management, his riding is primarily dictated by his work and fishing schedule. When he does ride, he can be seen in a black with yellow trim riding jacket and pants, or a light grey summer riding jacket, with a hi-vis yellow helmet. Chad would like to learn off-road riding (he has not had the GS




This is a route that **Dan Siddens** and I did starting this past Saturday (8/27) through Wednesday (9/1).


Holloman Saddle Loop




Social Media Administrator

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

The Virgelle Ferry, one of three reported to be still operating in Montana, along with one at Carter and the third north of Winifred. Once in Virgelle, the restored Virgelle Mercantile is the destination place.


For a 21 mile dirt ride, exit Highway 87 south of Loma on the Loma Ferry Road and zig zag your way to the Virgelle Ferry on the south side of the Missouri river.

For a longer off-pavement ride, exit Highway 80 south-southeast of Fort Benton, and follow your GPS to the ferry landing.
