

News from the Club

Lots of things have happening within the club the officers wanted to pass along to you including key decisions and news from around the state.

First, in a meeting with Chris Keyes just before he officially resigned, the officers made **four decisions** that are important to note:

1. Canceling the traditional Christmas Party, usually scheduled for December the 4th at Big Sky Motorsports. The cancelation has much to do with three issues: One was that with Covid still a concern, it did not seem worth the risk to try to do a buffet dinner in an enclosed space. More importantly, December is a tough weather month that challenges folks to make it over passes that are traditionally snowed in, worse yet, members have to travel home in the dark. Lastly, it is also clear that we are no longer a Missoula centric club. We know that there are large clusters of folks a long way off from Missoula. So we are opting for a different approach this year. The club will fund up to \$100 to each cluster to throw its own party in their respective locations. The 5 clusters are <u>Missoula/</u><u>Bitterroot, Kalispell/White Fish/Big Fork/Polson, Helena, Bozeman, and Billings.</u>

The Huddy's have graciously agreed to organize the Helena cluster's party. So, we are looking for volunteers to host/organize the remaining clusters. You're encouraged to step up and offer your services either in a restaurant, home, or other venue to put something together for the members in those areas. The only requirement is that invoices be sent to the Secretary/Treasurer for payment and more importantly, to take lots of pictures for the January issue of the newsletter, forwarding them to Dick French before the end of the month. - 2. We have decided that the **membership card** effort was an idea before it's time and will not be carrying that forward. If we had tons of advertisers offering significant discounts, it might have made it easier for members to identify themselves to the advertisers. But that isn't the case currently. We'll revisit the idea at a future time when it makes more sense and we're willing to spend club money on wallet sized cards and the mailing each year of same.
- 3. **Ride Calendar:** Discussion around the remaining meeting on the calendar and the 2022 riding season sensed that maybe we should recognize that we are always going to be victimized by the Rocky's weather patterns. Maybe Jackson Hot Springs in November might have been wishful thinking. It will remain on the calendar, however, with hopes that fires will be out, roads open and no snow on the ground for the Jackson Hot Springs meeting.

News from the Club

Many of our traditional places may come back into next year's calendar, like Wisdom, Echo Lake Café, Double Arrow Lodge, Lincoln, Trixi's and other favorites. It could very well be that Covid, staff shortages and no indoor seating may drift into the riding season as obstacles, and we will need to be watchful for those changes. In the meantime, we could continue to have a smattering of "picnic" meetings in places where weather, Covid or other factors have deep sixed a scheduled meeting. And, we might add in places that would not ordinarily be considered a great venue, like Hauser Lake. We expect to deliver the Ride Calendar in time for the January Newsletter. New venues or ideas are welcome.

4. Elections: Mark Johnson has agreed to step into the President's role until the end of 2022. Dave McCormack will continue as Secretary Treasurer until the end of 2022. We are looking for a volunteer to act as a <u>board</u> <u>member</u> through the end of 2022 so that we have a three person voting bloc (a by-laws requirement) to ensure fair decision making on behalf of the club. The next elections are now scheduled for February of 2023 for all three Officer positions. Staggering terms of office was discarded as an idea because we didn't want to have an election every year, but rather as the by-laws stipulate, officers are elected for two year terms and elections should be on a two year schedule. This should give the club time to put an election together that will better serve the club.

Other news:

Trixi's meeting in Ovando turned out 21 souls, most on bikes. In general, even with Covid we averaged about



15% attendance at each of our meetings on the schedule. Thanks to all for making the effort and we will hopefully see you at Jackson Hot Springs on November 20th, Saturday at 1:00pm.

Dues are coming due as of January 1st, 2022. We have traditionally given current members until March 31st to get their money in. BMW Ambassadors - Kevin and Annie Huddy



Last week I was coming back from town in my car on a beautiful Fall Day.

As I arrived at the three way stop, at the "T" intersection of Green Meadow and Sierra Road right by the large Baptist Church—many of you may know this intersection and travel it regularly. I did indeed notice the helmeted rider and beautiful motorcycle to my right. There were no vehicles to my left, I checked twice.

The rider began his left turn in front of me. He had the right of way. It was at that moment that my appreciation for the smooth launch of the motorcycle turned abruptly to horror. A late model silver Nissan Rogue blew through the sign doing about 60-65 mph. The motorcy-

clist did a hard brake, got his left foot down, and kept the bike from falling. The Silver Nissan

never even slowed or braked.

I remember bringing both of my hands to my face and my mouth opening in a silent scream as I watched what would surely have been a horrific accident, unfurled in front of me, in less than three seconds.

The rider and I made eye contact but no words were exchanged. He sat for a moment and gathered himself. Other than what I imagined was his racing heart (or was that mine?), he seemed alright. I still do not know who the rider is, but he had a very white full mustache. His reactions were quick and good. He saved himself. I thought he must have had some excellent training.

Then I went after the silver Nissan. All I wanted was a license tag number. Getting close enough to get that I also laid on my horn until he turned right onto another street and pulled over. As I rolled down my window, so did the other driver. He was a male in his mid 40's, there was a blonde high school aged daughter in the passenger front seat. There were no pleasantries exchanged.

I immediately pointed out he had a run the stop sign, his response "Oh, yeah, sorry, just told my daughter I ran it." I also asked if he had seen the motorcyclist?

His response was a blank stare and ...crickets. The girl also had no reaction. The man repeated, "Sorry, I'm sorry."

I felt, and stated, that I thought he wasn't sorry at all, then I drove off as did he. From the time I pulled up to the stop sign to the end of the conversation was less than two minutes.

TWO MINUTES. The entire event left me shaken, I cannot imagine how that motorcyclist must have felt.

Several things come to mind here.

First, it was definitely my impression that the Nissan driver really DID NOT care that he had nearly killed someone, second that this was not the first (nor will it be the last) time he had run that stop sign, and third if he is the one teaching his daughter to drive, then she will be just like him.

And I can honestly say, in this day and age, that I probably should not have gone after the driver of the Nissan. I can only hope that my words struck a chord with either the driver or the daughter and they will have a conversation about the event.



This could have been a deadly event. I would have been the witness or seriously injured myself as I sat in my car. Truly, I was amazed at how quickly this all unfolded ,right in front of me. It could have been any one of us on that bike. It could have been someone we know or love.

If you think your skills need brushing up either on a bike or driving a car, please, please take a refresher class. I don't want to be a witness.

Editor's Note: Several years ago, Annie provided an article by John Sullivan, a Royal Air Force pilot, an avid cyclist and a frequent motorcyclist. 

I rented a Yamaha Tenere 700 from MotoVermont (<u>https://www.motovermont.com/</u>) and rode a modified version of what the BMW MOV (Motorcycle Owners of Vermont, <u>https://</u> <u>bmwmov.club/</u>) called the <u>Puppy Dog Route</u> (PDR). The full PDR goes from Greenfield, MA to Derby Line, VT. I picked it up in Putney, VT (about 18 miles north of the MA/VT border) and rode north, with a side visit to Middlebury, VT where my son goes to college, to Derby Line on the border

with Canada. The route is a good mix of paved and unpaved roads, though mostly unpaved. The riding is smooth, as dirt roads in Vermont (except for the Class 4 unmaintained roads) are mostly better than anything paved we have here in Montana. The fall colors were stunning; it was an amazing ride. The Vermont countryside and the little towns were beautiful. Lots of big white churches and country



stores. I went through 8 covered bridges, and saw lots of turkeys and cows, mostly dairy, of course. The map of my ride --793.3 miles over 4 days -- includes the PDR, and my route from Burlington to Putney and



from Derby Line back to Burlington, with a side trip to the Champlain Islands.

In the future, I hope to ride the NEBDR, which runs 1,317 miles from Hancock, NY to the border with Canada in New Hampshire. The NEBDR includes more tech-

nical riding on Class 4 roads, so I look forward to finding another victim, I mean rider, to do that with.

And for those curious about the

Tenere 700. It was a nice bike to ride. It handled well on and off pavement (it was outfitted with Mitas EO7 tires). It is a very light feeling motorcycle (spec is 452 lbs.) with plenty of low-end power and the ability to do highway speeds comfortably (65 mph in Vermont). Like all bikes, it has some idiosyncrasies, but nothing that would be a deal breaker if one was inclined to buy one. There are antilock brakes, which are easy to turn off, and no traction control to have to fiddle with. The bike seems well suited to rigorous adventure riding with minimal additional outfitting.








Social Media Administrator

She completed the off-road course conducted in conjunction with the BMW MOA Rally in Great Falls; completed an off-road riding course in Moab, Utah; rode with a group on an Idaho BDR ride, and most recently completed a four-day-women-only course sponsored my West38Moto.

The course, conducted in the area near Ouray, Colorado, focused on some of the details of building confidence in off-road riding, especially those which may be of concern for female rid-

ers. For example, lifting a fallen bike. Rebecca reports that mastering this task has strengthened her confidence level tremendously. Training exercises

included long sessions of tight slow speed turns, numerous cone exercises and stopping-starting on a hill, and how to turn your bike around to descend a hill too steep to continue.

Rebecca's persistence in training and skills enhancement are in preparation for a four-week guided tour of Chile in January 2022. Her BMW F750GS is in San Antonio, Texas and will be freighted out to Chile on November 26, along with the bikes of the other participants in the tour. 


POISTION OPENING AT THE MONTANA BMW RIDERS

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
