






Report from the Road - Iceland - Dave Fishbaugh

## Iceland - DO IT!



Iceland is a unique, active volcanic island of fire and ice on the western edge of Europe. If you are going to visit, you need to know a little bit about the geology because Iceland's existence and its landscape are all about the geology. It is not easy to say how many eruptions have occurred in Iceland. However, recent volcanic activity shows that on average there is an eruption every 5-years or approximately 200 eruptions in the last 1000 years. The total number of eruptions may be 5 million. So, if you go, there is a chance to experience an eruption or be entombed in ash (cool).



What is causing these eruptions? Iceland sits on two different sources of volcanic activity. The first is the Mid-Atlantic Ridge or Riff which runs through the middle of the Atlantic Ocean shown in the figure as thick red lines in Iceland. The riff is the source for deep volcanic material and is the separation point between the North American Plate and the European Plate. Each year, North America and Europe move farther apart on an average of 2-cm. The photo to the right shows the surface expression of the riff with the European Plate on the right and the North American Plate on the left.





Iceland and Montana/Wyoming have something in common. Iceland also has a mantel plume just like Yellowstone. The hot spot was in Greenland at one time, but as the North American Plate moves west the fixed position of the hot spot in the mantle is now under Iceland. It is the combination of the riff and the plume that produces numerous geothermal features (used as the power source for Iceland) and geysers (see accompanying photos). Beware, in Iceland there are no restrictions on how close you can come to these geothermal features. It's dangerously crazy.

#### Landscape

There are of course, glaciers and icebergs along the coast. Water falls from glacial runoff are massive. Coastal beaches are of volcanic sand and gravel, but I never saw anyone swimming. (I am sure you can guess why.) The scenery is gorgeous in all directions no mater where you are on the island.

## Riding

You really need to put Iceland on your riding list. Are there paved roads, loaded with switchbacks, over high mountain passes like on the European continent? No. The paved roads are in towns and a few of the major highways. There is a paved 800-mile highway called the Ring Road that circles the entire island (see photo below).





Motorcycle clubs from England ship their bikes to Iceland so that they can ride on gravel roads. We ran across one such club. The following pictures will give you some idea about the riding conditions. If you see someone riding in yellow rain gear, I am it.

**Riding** - The roads that go into the interior and high into the mountains are predominantly a mixture of volcanic gravel and mud. The gravel roads are well maintained. Some have water filled potholes, but over all in good shape. It rains <u>frequently</u> so you are dealing with some mud but mostly gravel and standing water. One morning we rode over the highest pass on the island. It was a road consisting of probably 50/50 mud-gravel we rode in pouring rain and heavy fog with no guardrails. Those of us riding with our wives (4 of us) did it two-up. We all made it and one of the following photos shows us hosing off our riding gear. Everyone in our group was riding a BMW F800GS. When riding on the coast, especially in the fiords, the wind can be fearsome.

Depending on the road, you may have a few river crossings. One day we had 21 crossings, all through the same river. We had 8 bikes, so that is 168 crossings and only two bikes went down, not bad. I was the least experienced and this was my maiden voyage crossing rivers (power is your savior). The water was clear, cold, and moving with cobble size gravel as the base.

The hotels in Iceland are clean, new, and predominantly made of metal. They generally have an associated restaurant or one nearby. They all include full breakfast in European style.

The food was excellent, especially if you like fish. I ate whale and puffin one night at a tapas restaurant; I do not recommend either. The custom in Iceland is to start your meal with soup, not salad.









Ah well, the intent of the contest was to provide a venue for our dirt riding members, possibly appeal to some younger members, and hopefully to acquire some good ride tracks, photos, and stories to share with club members. Obviously that didn't happen. I'm not going to bother trying to analyze or decipher why this might be other than to make the observation that these riding contests really don't appear to be something that our members are very interested in. We've had poor participation in the last few contests and even our annual mileage

## Monthly Meeting - Trixi's Antler Saloon - Ovando

Trixi's, always a popular venue for the MON-TANA BMW RIDERS monthly meetings, with weather varying from snow to an outstanding fall day, as it was this year. That probably contributed to the 22 riders of the 29 attendees - a great turnout.

Trixi McCormick, the daughter of a one-time Ravalli County sheriff, grew up in the Bitter Root valley. Reportedly a petite five-feet-two lady, developed skills as a trick rider making her way in life as a rodeo performer. She preformed locations as diverse as Sidney, Australia and the Calgary Stampede. In the late 1950's she bought a bar in downtown



Ovando, now the town Museum. (The June, 2022 issue of the newsletter featured an article on this museum.) When Montana Route 20, which ran through Ovando, was replaced by Route 200, by-passing the town, Trixi reestablished the saloon to its present location, at the top of a hill in a bend in Route 200. The buildings were a conglomeration of existing buildings relocated from Fort Harrison (a hospital barracks) and some cabins from the Bearmouth area. The pieces were reassembled and turned into a functioning saloon and café relying heavily on volunteered help. She soon established a reputation for fine food, and a no-nonsense bar. Trixi's is a character of Montana folk lore. (*Editor*)

## Report from the Road - Editor

Your editor was in Colorado Springs, Colorado recently, via United Air Lines rather than BMW, visiting my kid sister. She tolerates her older brother's ideocracies, an 80+ year old still riding motorcycles, and guided me to **The Rocky Mountain Motorcycle Museum**. She does have an eye for motorcycles!

Although the history of the museum is a bit obscure, it was located adjacent to the Harley Davidson dealership at one time, and then relocated to the second floor of a food court in downtown Colorado Springs. The bistro on second floor provides the usual motorcycle rider fare - sandwiches and beer - but with a view and access to about 100 antique and vintage motorcycles. The vintage ranges from the early 1900's to the 1970's with an emphasis on Indian motorcycles. A significant number of Harley-Davidsons are included, as well as some non-American manufactures, a lone BMW and some brands that no longer exist.

If you are ever in Colorado Springs, I recommend a visit to The Rocky Mountain Motorcycle Museum to see some perfectly restored and maintained vintage and antique motorcycles. Forks rebuilt (new seals) and re-valved and converted to open bath by AMA Hall of Fame off road racer Ty Davis @ Zip Ty Racing. This is a dream project that I've been working on for two years now. But sadly, I need to abandon it and go to plan B, my 2016 Husky FE 501. The 701 has been lowered 4" because I am a burly 5'5", with 29" inseam and 135lb and even with these mods the 701 is too much for me.

The suspension lowering was done in such a way as to be easily reversible to stock or another dimension as desired. I even bought a kickstand for a 690 Duke to avoid cutting the stock 701 stand. (I have 13 shock springs and 10 fork spring sets to accommodate my various KTM/Husky projects.) Extras include a Flatland aluminum skid plate, a really

sleek white powder coated luggage rack, an aluminum case saver, a plastic skid bumper for the rear master cylinder, a printed service manual, a plastic guard for the rear ABS sensor wire, and Cycra handguards. Yet more: Tusk exhaust heat shield, extra seat, LED brake light and LED front blinkers and 2 12V ports; 1 SAE, 1 BMW.

It has four engine performance maps accessible without tools; mild, wild, normal and "bad gas." 2016-2018 Husqvarna 701 Enduro/Supermoto Pannier Racks by UK Rally Raid are really good looking and have been found used online.

Tires are Hidenau Dual Sport K60 Scout (R) with tread of 6mm and K60 (F) with tread of 4mm. The left button on the factory Trail Tech speedo has corroded because the speedo case leaked. Rocky Mountain ATV has speedometers for \$185.50. The original speed feature and odometers still work. Willing to consider Beta Evo Trials bike or Husqvarna 701 Vit Pilen or Svart Pilen in trade.






