Vice-President, K Bill Clark

Last month, I promised you a short 'motorcycle' biography of the Club's newly elected Vice President, **K. Bill Clark** and the Secretary-Treasurer, **Albert Murray**. Both have been forth coming with their backgrounds and how they became motorcycle riding enthusiasts. The following sections are 'their stories'. *Editor*



K. Bill Clark and Motorcycling

Way back when before the internet, colleges advertised their offerings to guidance counselors in big thick books. I found a college that advertised being 16 miles from a ski area and moved to Bozeman immediately after high school in Wisconsin. I received a B.S. in Earth Sciences (geology), then bummed around skiing and packing mules for 4 years, and eventually attended graduate school in Missoula (hydrogeology). I spent my career as a consulting hydrogeologist, selling my ownership in a firm in 2022. I am "part-time retired" because I think they (former coworkers) *should* still need me. The truth is they think I am retired, not required. Here is how I came to the club:

- A few years before turning 50 and replacing a hip, a friend introduced me to the notion of "adventure motorcycling".
 I bought the book Adventure Motorcycling Handbook by Chris Scott and read it on a plane to west Africa where I was working.
- My friend had a KLR 650 and I was convinced that I needed one too. Just a mere 15 or so years ago, the *Missoulian* want ads were *the* source to find local used motorcycles.
- I finally found one that a rancher in Florence was selling because he was buying a BMW!
- I took the Basic Rider Course in Missoula and spent a summer learning to ride the KLR.
- The next Memorial Day, an uninsured motorist rear-ended me on the KLR, and I experienced the hardness of Missoula asphalt. The accident convinced me that I needed to switch bikes and buy a BMW, just because...
- A friend in Helena had a black, 2005 BMW F650GS with a salmon-colored seat. He bought it used in Virginia and was afraid [of his wife] to ride it. I wasn't.
- I added the typical stuff to the bike to make it suitable for trips (racks, panniers, engine guards, etc.). A few friends with V-Strom's, KLRs and BMWs grouped up for weekly evening rides and monthly camping trips. The goal was half-dirt/half-pavement. Our "gang" leader was a risk-taker and former motocross rider whose skills I will never attain. During every single ride I exceeded my skill level and was scared-spitless at least once.
- The "gang" slowly dissolved due to age, pressure to stop riding from wives, divorce, personal tragedy, etc. About that time, I met Larry Bannister and our esteemed editor (Dick may not remember the encounter at the BMW shop) (*Editor's Note I remember the time well*).
- Larry had bought a Triumph Tiger 800 XT and convinced me that 3 cylinders and the Tiger growl were good for the soul. I agreed and traded in the BMW for a red Tiger XRT (e.g., heated seat) in 2018.
- With a new bike I decided I needed to belong to a new motorcycle gang. Larry told me about the Montana BMW Riders Club, emphasizing safety, fun and riding opportunities. He also indicated the Club would excuse the Triumph knowing that I spent +20k miles on a BMW...ha!
- Since joining the Club, I have met many fantastic people with knowledge and motorcycle experience/s that I will never have. I have a lot left to learn and admit it. Heck, I even bought a Yamaha WR250R (like Phil Haglund's) to learn (hopefully) to ride better on dirt roads.
- Lastly and importantly, my wife of 39 years has no use for motorcycles (horses yes) but is very glad that I belong to a club with "mature" and safe members.

I started riding dirt bikes as a kid after a BMX bicycling just wasn't providing enough thrills. Seemed like the natural progression.

Then, as a young man, I graduated up to road bikes purchasing a '79 Honda CX500 Custom (Refer to the photo nearby).

I also had an undressed '79 Honda Goldwing and '88 Kawasaki Eliminator ZL (one fast ass motorcycle!!)

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TECH DAYS - Huddy's Outpost

TECHDAY 2023 AT THE OUTPOST

TechDay 2023 will be held on **Saturday, May 20th** at the Huddy's Outpost located in the Helena area.

TechDay was first held in 2013 and except for a pandemic caused break has been a been a yearly event. When we first thought of holding a TechDay at our home we envisioned a gathering of a dozen or so riders, all working on their motorcycles or helping a fellow rider with their bikes..... boy, were we mistaken. With support of the Montana BMW Riders, TechDay became an event that many look forward to each year. As many as 70 people have attended a TechDay with a slow year (bad weather) having around 25 attendees. Work on motorcycles has and will continue to be the primary activity of TechDay, but many



people attend to socialize with old and new friends in an environment that encourages meeting and getting to know others. All are welcome and we especially hope to see many of our newer members attend.

TechDay is an opportunity to get your motorcycle ready for a summer of riding by performing basic maintenance in a well-equipped shop and with the help of other experienced riders. The shop includes two lifts, an air-compressor, tirechanger, carb/throttle body synching meters, GS911 code reader and an assortment of other common tools. You provide the tires, oil, filters, plugs and other consumables. If you are having your tires shipped you may have them shipped directly to the Outpost or bring them with you. Free disposal of tires, oil and filters will be provided. If you are new to working on your bike, then there will be others there to assist; including with changing tires. If you are an experienced wrench then we need your expertise as well.

Activities begin at 9 a.m. and run until whenever on Saturday, May 20th. There are some cots and other places to sleep or camp for those that would like to arrive in the afternoon of Friday, May 19th, and/or stay Saturday night May 20th. There will be a BBQ on Saturday afternoon and other sustenance for those who are arriving early or staying longer. BYOB. <u>The monthly club ride for May will be on Sunday, May 21st at Lakeside on Hauser Lake. Lakeside is an 18 mile ride from the Outpost.</u>



The Outpost is NW of Helena and located approximately 7.5 miles west of I-15 (Exit 200) and approximately 23 miles east of Flesher Pass on Lincoln Road (HWY 279). The address is **6750 Silver Fox Court.** Silver Fox Court is south off of Lincoln Road and the Outpost is the last house on the right. Phone: **406 438-6776**. (*46°43'53.4"N 112°09'23.7"W*)

Safety Course Incentive Program (SCIP) Calendar Year 2023

The purpose of the Safety Course Incentive Program (SCIP) is to encourage safe and responsible riding habits by partially underwriting continuing motorcycle skill education taken by members of the Montana BMW Riders Motorcycle Club.

- 1. During calendar year 2023 \$400 is allocated to the SCIP.
- 2. Kevin Huddy is the administrator of the SCIP.
- 3. Up to eight club members can get a maximum of \$50 in a calendar year to reimburse the cost of taking an <u>approved</u> motorcycle safety course.
- 4. To qualify the rider must be a member in good-standing (dues paid) of the Montana BMW Riders as of 1 April 2023, as well as at the time the course is taken. Kevin will coordinate with the Secretary/Treasurer to confirm an applicant's membership status.
- 5. Courses offered by the Motorcycle Safety Foundation (https://motorcycle.msun.edu), Lee Parks Total Control, RawHyde Adventures or courses created by the BMW Motorrad Performance Center are approved.
- Members <u>must</u> request approval by Kevin of courses other than those listed in line 5. To gain approval, the course must include instruction on, and practical application of riding skills and knowledge designed to enhance rider safety; and may have either an on-road or off-road focus. Track days do not qualify.
- 7. If more than eight members qualify for reimbursement, then the club leadership will consider increasing the funding allocation to cover the additional applicants. The final decision on a funding increase will be based primarily on the availability of additional discretionary funds in the club's budget.
- 8. Money will be allocated based on when a completed request for reimbursement is received by Kevin; first come, first paid.
- 9. Only one course per member is reimbursable in a calendar year.
- 10. Requests for reimbursement can be made after the completion of an approved safety course, but must be received prior to October 1, 2023. Payments will be made in October once all applications are in.
- 11. Submit requests for reimbursement to Kevin (huddykl@gmail.com); requests must include proof of successful completion of the course. Proof can be in the form of a legible copy, scan or photo-graph of the original document.
- 12. Kevin Huddy will coordinate with the club Treasurer, to arrange payment.

Report from the Road - Lance Lerum




We are all enjoying serving as test riders on the Royal Enfield Interceptor and BSA Gold Star in Ireland. So far we can attest to them doing quite

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
Report from the Road - John DiBari

Monthly Meeting - Bank Bar and Vault Restaurant - Wilsall, Montana

Sunny, if not warm weather greeted 23 motorcycle enthusiasts at the Bank Bar and Vault Restaurant in Wilsall, Montana on the 23rd of April. That includes three guests, 12 riders and two sidecars. A great 'coming out' party for the 2023 riding season.

President Larry Manchester conducted the meeting, and claimed the longest distance—from Corvallis and return in same day, 520+ miles. Secretary-Treasurer, Al Murray handled the new membership and raffle duties, while recovering from knee surgery.

This 'centroid' of the MONTANA BMW RIDERS region gave all a chance to meet and talk with members that we do not see often. I was not able to identify everyone in the photos nearby, but did list all the attendees at the end of this article.

Wilsall probably fits the classical definition of "...a wide spot in the road...." applied to many Montana communities. Wilsall, however, has more character than most, if not any other Montana small town. From the mural on the Wilsall Mercantile Company wall, to the Bank Bar and Vault Restaurant, the location of our meeting, to the streets that fade into the distant snow capped Crazy Mountains to the

east, it has character to remember.

In 1806 when William Clark of the Lewis and Clark Expedition reached the Yellowstone river near present day Livingston, they named the first major tributary they encountered from the north the "Shields" after the company's blacksmith.

Not long after trappers and fur traders, symbolized by "Thunder Jack", a roadside statue erected a few miles north on Highway 89 by the town of Wilsall.



Jim Bridger guided emigrant wagon trains from Fort Laramie, Wyoming to Virgina City, Montana in the 1860s. His route came up the Shield River Valley from the Yellowstone and then crossed the divide to the west into the Gallatin Valley.

Wilsall is on the western side of a great motorcycle riding loop from Bozeman, north on Highway 86 past Bridger Ski Bowl and the Bridger Mountain Range on the west, to its intersection with Highway 89, then south through Wilsall to Livingston. Along the way, you will pass the Old Sedan Church, established in 1898. Refer to the photo close by.

One more recent notable from Wilsall is a western musical group, the Ringling 5 who, in the early 2000's preformed throughout the country. A group of five, and sometimes six or seven were all from a rural ranching and farming background, and found a way to write and perform music that, usually in a humorous way, related to the life in the Shields Valley. For the Ringling 5, put (<u>http:/treasurestatelifestyles.com</u>) in your search engine.

We will return to Wilsall.
