Presidents Corner — Larry Manchester

I just completed my leg in the 2023 Ride for Liberty relay ride. This is the third year I have participated in this ride. A copy of the Bill of Rights starts in southern California in early May and works its way up to Oregon, Washington and over to Idaho. Two ladies from Boise, Idaho bring the document to Montana where I meet them. This year we met in Missoula and from there I took it to Evanston, Wyoming, where I met up with my Son. We rode together to deliver the BOR to some Colorado riders who met us in Vernal, Utah. I covered 1,745 miles in total. The ride this year turned out to be very challenging to this old rider. I rode Wednesday afternoon from Corvallis to Belgrade to stay the night at my daughter's place. It was very nippy, temperature in the low 50's with strong winds the entire way. I rode over Lost Trail pass and through Wisdom, Jackson Hot springs, Dillon, Whitehall, Cardwell, Norris and on to Belgrade. Yes, I know that's not the most direct route to Belgrade, just wanted to avoid the Interstate and see more country.

Thursday, I decided to ride from Belgrade to Riverton, Wyoming. Again, not the shortest route to my eventual destination Evanston, but I decided to see some country I had not seen in some time and visit with some family and friends. That is the beauty of the Ride for Liberty, you can pick your route as long as you meet up at the predetermined handoff location on time. I left Belgrade and rode to Big Sky and on to West Yellowstone. Forty-five degrees when I left Belgrade. As many of you may know, the highway from Big Sky to West Yellowstone has heavy traffic in the summer as the tourists are in full force. Throw in some highway construction and it made it slow going. From West Yellowstone I rode to Ashton, Idaho and took Highway 32 over to Driggs and Victor, Idaho. Put this on your bucket list if you have never ridden it. It is 35 miles of winding road through fields of grain and potatoes with views of the backside of the Tetons in the distance. Not much traffic either so it was a glorious ride. I then rode over Teton Pass and dropped down into Jackson, Wyoming with thousands of tourists all in a hurry to get somewhere. Just stopped long enough to take the customary picture of the Antler Arch and headed north through Grand Teton National Park. I worked for many years in Yellowstone and Jackson for the telephone company so do not feel inclined to spend a lot of time in those places. Kind of sad to see all the growth that has happened over the years. After leaving Grand Teton National Park, I headed over Togwotee pass towards my destination of Riverton. It was 40 degrees at the summit of the pass with some wind. Glad to have several layers on and put the heated grips on the Super Ténéré to good use. More highway construction just east of Dubois, Wyoming. Had to wait for 30 minutes for the pilot car to lead us through. The flagger, a nice Native American lady from Ft. Washakie waved me to the front of the line. They always try to put motorcycles in the front for their safety, she told me. Turns out we knew a lot of the same people. I worked closely with the tribal right of way department in the Wind River Indian Reservation as part of my job and her cousin was one of the agents I knew quite well. Small world we live in.

I made it to Riverton around 8:00 pm, checked into my cheap room, (quick note, you get what you pay for) and headed to the nearby KFC for a quick bite.

Met my older brother from Shoshoni for breakfast the next morning. Had a nice visit over a good meal. I was not in a terrible hurry as I only had a 4 hour ride to Evanston in front of me. In looking at the weather report I noticed some rain and thunderstorms forecast but nothing looked terrible. I went up to visit my old boss from my Engineering days in Riverton. Visited for a while and the TV was on in the background. A national weather alert for dangerous hail and thunderstorms appeared on the TV. A guick look at the radar on my smart phone showed some nasty weather headed my way. Just then, some hail started to pound the house. My old boss opened his garage and I put the bike inside just in time to avoid golf ball size hail. The hail quit after 20 minutes with just light rain. Another look at the radar and it looked fairly clear going towards Evanston. I put on my rain gear and headed out in the light rain. After 3 miles the light rain turned into a downpour with strong winds. Damn radar! It cleared up shortly before Lander, Wyoming and I stopped for gas and a text to let the wife know my location. The sky was dark in the direction of South Pass so I knew I would be in some rain. South Pass is known for its wind, it is the southern portion of the Wind River Mountain range. Boy did I find some wind to go along with the rain. All was good up to the Sweetwater Highway Rest stop, just 20 mile or so wind gusts with very light rain. But looking south I could see a dark and ominous cloud bank forming with flashes of lightning in the distance. I noticed two Harley riders going by with the typical ape hanger handlebars, loud pipes, and no windshields. They had no rain gear on, just short sleeves under leather vests and of course, no helmets. They were going pretty fast and I just shook my head as they disappeared in the distance. I headed out and within five minutes I hit the brunt of the storm. Driving rain, lightning and winds that I learned later were gusting at 65 miles per hour. This is a long stretch of highway with no shelter, just wide open sagebrush as far as you can see. The traffic I was meeting was fighting the wind also, several campers were leaned over as were a couple of big rigs. I had no choice but to fight on. I was glad the Super Ténéré is a heavy bike, around 630 pounds with the panniers. With my 215 pounds of pure muscle added on, the Super "T" was holding its own to stay on the road. The wind was a direct cross wind, and gusting so I had a tight grip on the bars with the bike leaned way over into the wind. I noticed a vehicle following me at a safe distance, probably just worried about this crazy biker. It was 20 miles of terrible riding, I thought several times I was going to be blown off the road. The water was standing an inch deep on the roadway and I was worried about losing traction. Finally broke through the storm three miles from the small town of Farson. Pulled into the local gas station where there were several campers, trucks, and the two Harley riders trying to calm down after the drive. The two riders turned out to be members of the Bandido's Motorcycle club. They were drenched head to feet and were visibly shaking while smoking outside the gas station. One of them looked at me with my three coats, rain-

gear, full face helmet and said, "...now I know why you wear all the S*^*t!" I just nodded and moved on, they did not seem in the best of spirits. Wind all the remaining ride to Evanston made the ride slow. Finally made Evanston around 6:00 that night. What a day, one for the memory book.

The ride the next day to Vernal with my son was thankfully uneventful. Nice ride over the Uinta Mountains with views of Flaming Gorge Reservoir. Lots of sun with no wind. Handed off the BOR to the Colorado riders and returned to Evanston on the same route.

Made a long day of it and rode from Evanston, Wyoming to Corvallis, Montana the next day. Over 500 miles, went the long way through Afton, Wyoming; Rigby, Idaho and then up to Salmon to avoid the interstate. Heavy rain over Lost trail pass but no wind. Slept well that night.

I learned a few things on this 1,745 mile trip:

- 1) The Super Ténéré is a great road bike with a terrible seat. I will be getting a custom seat this winter for sure. An Air Hawk seat pad and cheap Walmart padded bicycle shorts made it somewhat tolerable.
- 2) Good rain gear is a must, and don't be an idiot and put it on in the rain. Put it on when you see the rain coming.
- 3) The Bandido's MC riders are not as tough as they think they are. Of course I did not tell them that.

We have some of the most breathtaking riding in the Western US at our doorstep. Take advantage of it!



Central Montana Event - August 5 - Reservation Deadline July 5

As a reminder I repeat this information.

We have reserved a block of Rooms at the Yogo Inn (yogoinn.com), **LEWISTOWN**, Montana for both August 4 and 5 for any that want to arrive a day early and take a day ride on Saturday. We will come up with some route ideas for both GS and road riders. The rate at the Yogo Inn is \$125.00 plus tax for a total of about \$136.00 per night. When you call, ask for the MT BMW Riders rate, your credit card will not be charged until arrival and cancelations prior to 24 hours of arrival will not be charged. We need to fill at least 8 rooms to get this rate or it will go back to rack rate in effect at the time. The Yogo Inn will hold the rooms until **July 5** and then let them go back to the hotel. Reserve now and let club leadership know how many are attending so we can plan properly, **text me at 406-599-5226**.

The Yogo Inn number is 406-535-8721. The Yogo Inn has a liberal cancelation policy, up to 24 hours prior to arrival date.

There is a great brewery, Big Spring Brewery, across the street from the Yogo Inn crafting great beers from that fabulous Big Spring water.

Other options include free first come first serve camping at the Kiwanis Campground west of Lewistown with restrooms and water available.

There is a music festival known as Centerfest that weekend as well so we have competition for rooms and food, at the same time some might enjoy the music festival. See centerfestmt.com for details if interested and for tickets.

Report from the Road - Dave and Mary Fishbaugh



ROCKS

Rocks can be a road hazard in more ways than one.

Mary and I decided this spring, now that we are another year older, maybe we should buy a road bike. We have only owned GS's. So, we bought a 2023, fully loaded R1250RT triple black, with cruise control (Wow, do I like that cruise control!). One of our great-nieces was getting married June 3rd in LA and we were invited. So, we thought that would be a great maiden voyage for the new bike. We boxed up our wedding and rehearsal dinner clothes in a FedEx box and shipped them off to our hotel. We set off on a 3,100-mile bike ride through the southwest. As you know, I like to collect stories on bike trips, and certainly we did collect a few. However, sometimes the route you pick is telling a story.

We started out riding over a low saddle in the Bridger and Belfry Montana area that lies between the Beartooth Plateau to the west, and the Pryor Mountains on the east. We dropped into the Big Horn Basin, rode over the Heart Mountain Detachment Fault and exited the basin through the Wind River Canyon, which cuts through the Owl Creek Mountains. South of the canyon, we dropped into the Wind River Basin. Heading west, we passed over South Pass (a hump on the Oregon Trail) and into the 3,500 square miles of the Great Divide Basin. Heading south, we rode over both the Rawlins and the Rock Springs uplifts in the Flaming Gorge area located on the north flank of the Uinta Mountains. Turning west, we went over the Unita Mountains with the Colorado Plateau and Unita Basin to our left. We rode over the Wasatch Fault and into the Basin and Range area of southern Utah and Ne-

vada ending up in Death Valley. Finally, we arrived in Clearmont CA (north side of LA).

Returning, we headed west from LA, wand passed through the Mojave Dessert. If you have to ride through that dessert on June 4th of any year, don't do it! 107⁰ F! From there we rode up onto the Kaibab Plateau to the Grand Canyon. Continuing east, we rode through Painted Desert, Monument Valley, and the Four Corners area. From there we headed north unto the Uncompandere Plateau and on through the mountains of western Colorado including the Piceance and Sand Wash basins. Finally, we repeated of the geology of Wyoming on our home stretch.

Now why did I tell you this? Where do roads get curvy? Where there are out-crops of rocks. I am a geologist. I like rocks, geologic structures, and



interpreting the depositional environments of sedimentary rocks. Rocks are a serious hazard for motorcyclist who have an interest in rocks. Before Mary and I had a helmet-to-helmet com system. Mary would tap the back of my helmet once for "slow down" and twice for "watch the road not the rocks." I can't count the number of times I heard that on this trip.

You know what I get to see riding on a trip like this? Asphalt, concrete, double yellow lines, orange construction cones, the rearends of semi's, RV's, cars and pickups. The scenery I get is similar to those digital picture things that sit on someone's coffee table and flash random pictures of their vacations and family photos. Maybe I should wear one of those cameras on my helmet. Then when I get home, I can review what I missed. I would recommend that bird watchers should not ride motorcycles.

This trip was long, hot, but never endingly beautiful. And the rocks were phenomenal! Both Mary and I have a new appreciation for the beauty of rural Nevada. And even Mary wants to return to Death Valley (but in the winter) to explore the crazy geology.


Report from the Road - Kim Lemke



CMA National Rally, Gillette, WYOMING June 20th to the 25th

Total miles at 1,154 and lots of fun! The best part is I didn't think about work, not even one time during the trip!!


PS. Got to see the train bridge collapse and derailment just past Columbus on the way home!


