Presidents Corner — Larry Manchester



We have had some great rides this spring and summer to the monthly luncheon meetings of our Club. September's ride to Ennis for lunch at the Sportsman Lodge was right up there at the top of the list. I was joined by fellow club officers, **K Bill Clark** and **Al Murray**, along with good friend and fellow Bitterrooter, **Ken Sen** for the Ride. K Bill on a Triumph 800, Al on a BMW 1200RT, Ken on a Triumph 1200, and me on my Yamaha Super Teneré 1200. It was a little nippy when we headed south out of Hamilton at 9:15 am but being the experienced riders that we claim to be, we all had several layers of riding gear and were comfortable.

The ride south through Darby and up Lost Trail pass is one of my favorites and I make it many times during riding season, and it did not let us down. We stopped at the top of Lost Trail pass for a break and took some pictures. I promised our Editor Dick French to take some pictures of our adventure, so I

did not let him down. When you put several road warriors together and you get a lot of storytelling. This led to our demise to make our schedule, but more on that later.

After some stories we headed towards Wisdom along Highway 43. There was just a little color starting to show on the trees and bushes along the road, and along with very light traffic this part of the ride was very enjoyable. The same was true as we left Wisdom and headed south towards Jackson Hot springs and Dillon. We stopped at Big Hole Pass with a panoramic view of the Big Hole Valley for another stretch and potty break. Three very mature adult men, (aka OLD) require several nature calls to complete a ride of this magnitude. Again, the story telling started and before long we had spent more time than my MapQuest route planner allowed. We cruised into Dillon, the last 4 miles on the Interstate. That was the only Interstate on the route to Ennis. A quick gas stop in Dillon and then on to Twin Bridges where we

took a right and headed to Sheridan, Alder, and Virgina City. Great two-lane riding with scenery and lots of curves.



As I rode through Virginia City at the posted speed limit of 25, I wished for some time to visit some of the quaint shops along the main street, but a quick glance at the clock on the bike reminded me that we were already behind schedule. The ride from Virginia City to Ennis has to be one of the top rides in Montana, although not real long. The view is amazing with several switchbacks to keep you on your toes. We pulled into the Sportsman Lodge at 1:10, 10 minutes behind schedule. The parking lot was full with a lot of bikes and RVs. As usual the riders of our Club tend to arrive early at the lunch meetings so the table was already full of 21 happy riders in heavy conversation. The four of us grabbed an empty booth nearby and hoped everyone would forgive us for being fashionably late.

Lunch was good, service great and more storytelling made the time fly by.

We decided to ride back via Butte. Al led us through Cardwell to Whitehall, and then over the old Highway on Pipestone pass. More curves, more smiles, and more tire rubber left along the road. Al took us into the cemetery along a street as we entered Butte. There, we saw the gravesites of **Evil Knievel**, **Robbie Knievel** and Evel's parents. More storytelling and we parted ways with Al as he headed home to Helena. The remaining three gassed up in Rocker, and we headed on the Interstate towards Missoula. K Bill stayed on the Interstate to Missoula, and Ken and I took the exit to Anaconda where we headed up Mill Creek and dropped over into the Big Hole Valley. Through Wisdom and

Lost Trail and before we knew it, we were back in the Bitterroot Valley.


My trip meter read 456 miles. I was tired, my butt hurt a little, but I had a smile on my face as I walked into the house and smelled the chili my wife had on the stove.

MONTANA MOTORCYCLE RIDER SAFETY - Kim Lemke

I received an email from the Office of the Commissioner of Higher Education, Montana University System relative to the operational status of the Montana Motorcycle Rider Safety program that many of us have participated in over the years. The email read:

"MSU Northern, the Commissioners' Office, and Helena College have reached an agreement to move the operations of the MMRS program to Helena College. Moving the program to a more central location may be beneficial for several reasons, including the recruitment and training of coaches, as well as the potential to meet more of the demand for motorcycle training by offering more trainings. Helena College is also experienced in community education and has an established relationship with the Department of Justice to provide space for skills tests as needed. A job posting for the Director's position will be posted at Helena College in the coming days."

One of our activities this year was the Advanced RiderCourse conducted by **Ken Conrad** and **Udell Sharp** at the facility noted. Ironically, Helena, or East Helena is about the geographical center of the MONTANA BMW RIDERS far flung empire, so this operational change will in-fact, place it in the middle of our area. Perhaps it will result in additional, and more diverse training programs.





Report from the Road - "...and then there were two...." - John DiBari

The ride began from the Flathead, where Joseph Puglielli (KTM 790 Adventure R), Dave Dixon (BMW F800 GS), and Dan Siddens (KTM 790 Adventure) left for my house in Missoula. The guys spent the night, and we headed out just before 9:00 am, Saturday 9/2. I rode my Yamaha Teneré 700.

The goal was to do a couple of sections of the Great Continental Divide route from near Jackson, WY to Atlantic City, WY, then pick up the WYBDR heading north, finishing at the Montana/Crow Reservation boundary, and then head home (see proposed route).

By 1:00 pm Saturday we had our first casualty. Dave crashed his bike near Reservoir Lake on the route from Jackson, MT to Lemhi Pass, where, as it turns out, he broke his ankle. Dan and Dave rode to the hospital in Dillion, MT where

said broken ankle was confirmed. Dave's wife, Mary, drove down from Lakeside and picked up Dave in Dillon.

Meanwhile, Dan met me and Joseph at Bannack State Park where we camped

for the night.




In the morning, we headed into Dillon to pick up a tool to tighten my steering head nut, which had somehow come loose. We then headed out across the Centennial Valley, trying to beat the rain, on our way to the Flagg Ranch Campground about 30 miles north of Jackson, WY. We made it to Ashton, ID before the skies opened, complete with thunder, lightning, wind, and pouring rain. But with some good fortune, we found an abandoned bank drive-thru to shelter under until the storm passed.

On our way again, we rode the beautiful road the snakes between Yellowstone and Grand Teton National Parks. The surface was soggy and in places hail pellets were still visible from the passing storm, but the ride was great. It was



good we stopped in Ashton, or we would have been hailed on in the middle of nowhere. We got to our campsite, set up camp, ate dinner and proceeded to endure yet another thunderstorm, which dumped a lot of water. In fact, it dumped so much water our campsite turned into a lake, leaving the bottom quarter of my tent submerged. I had to venture into the storm to drag my tent out of the water to higher ground. Luckily nothing but the tent got wet.

The next morning, Labor Day, we packed up ready to pick up the Great Continental Divide route. While riding in the rain, Joseph's bike inexplicably stopped running while riding down the road. The TFT displayed the message "Kill Switch," which meant that his bike would start. By noon on day 3, Joseph was out, having his bike towed to Jackson, WY. Monica, Joseph's wife, drove down from Whitefish to retrieve him. Dan and I continued, but bailing on the first leg of the Great Continental Divide route we intended to ride. Rather, we headed straight for a hotel in Pinedale, WY, where we endured a ride through periodic rain and a high temperature of about 55 degrees. Brrrrr.

The next morning (Tuesday,) we suited up and headed out under overcast skies. We picked up the Great Continental Divide route and headed for Atlantic City, WY. The road was in great condition, but it never really warmed up and unfortunately low clouds obscured what I'm sure were amazing views. We made it to South Pass City, WY, a few

miles from Atlantic City and picked up the WYBDR heading north to Lander, WY. The riding was great – first through high elevation sage flats then into the mountains. We reached an elevation of about 8400' then rode down the Popo



Aggie River (pronounced puh-POE-zha) on some amazing twisties and into Lander. The sun came out and everything warmed up and dried out. Mercifully. This enabled Dan and me to visit the Lander Ace Hardware where I got some glue to fix my throttle, which was slipping on the grip – you know, turn the throttle but nothing happens. Not an ideal situation.

It was in Lander where we began to meet other BDR riders, whom we saw periodically

over the next 4 days. Lots of riders on KTMs from Tulsa, OK, and one on a busted up Norden 901. The guy crashed and lost his faring, right mirror and some other plastic parts.

On Tuesday, Dan and I started feeling sick, but we persevered. We picked up the BDR outside Shoshoni, WY. The road was in great shape, and we cooked along at between 45 and 50 mph. We made it to Ten Sleep, then up to Boulder Park Campground (~8000') to camp for the night. By then we were both fully sick.

Along the way, we ran into about a half-dozen riders from Texas (Tuareg 660, Teneré 700, 1250 GS and others I can't remember), and two guys from Tennessee on KTM 390s.

The next section of the WYBDR took us to Burgess Junction in the Bighorn Mountains. The trail got technical with lots of mud, puddles, imbedded rocks, sand, cows, roots and tight turns both up and down hill.

We met a large group from the Southeast, US just before the hard part started. We passed them and rode ahead for a while until Dan slipped in the mud and took a spill, dinging his ankle a bit. They passed us until one of their guys fell and we got ahead again. Later I crashed after getting snagged in some sand at too slow a pace. They passed us again. All was good.

Along the way we went up and over the Bighorns, visited an awesome wall of petroglyphs, and saw some amazing Wyoming red-rock scenery. Plus, we ran into the southeasterners again and joined them for lunch. We made it to Burgess Junction, got a hotel room and worked on feeling better. The next morning, we finished up the WYBDR.

The early part of the route was awesome. Amazing scenery in the Bighorns, riding through meadows and forest. The next part of the route was billed on the WYBDR Butler Map as "5-miles of two-track bliss." Unfortunately, it turned out to be more like 5-miles of two-track hell, but we got through it and eventually headed out across the tundra (or so it seemed) reaching 9800' on our way to the end of the route. On the way back from the finish, we bumped into the 901 guy and his partner, and passed the 390 riders from Tennessee.

After briefly stopping at the Medicine Wheel interpretive site, we outran a passing thunderstorm and headed down the mountain to Lovell, WY, where Dan bought a Covid test. He tested positive. Then I did. Ack.

For the past four days we had been shedding virus liberally across Wyoming. We don't know where we picked it up, but that explained why we were sick. We visited the Powell, WY emergency department where the diagnosis was confirmed. By then we were feeling a lot better, thankfully. Regardless, Dan got Paxlovid, and I picked up a bunch of over -the-counter medications. We headed for Red Lodge, MT, now wearing a mask wherever we went, and got a room for

the night. On Saturday, 7 days in, we headed for home under bright sunshine. Trip complete.

For me the ride was something like 1,640 miles. Add a couple of hundred for Dan's total. Dave had surgery on September 15th to put his ankle back together. He is doing well.



Joseph's bike is at Penco in Kalispell, where they can't figure out what is wrong. And Dan and I are feeling a ton better, ready to greet the world sans masks. I felt well enough to do another overnight ride (September 14th-15th) down the Lochsa River, up the Selway River,

over the mountains to Elk City, up through Kooskia, and home. A very scenic and pleasant 420-mile ride.

My next trip is a two-day ride around the Northeast Kingdom in Vermont the last week of September. I'm hoping the leaves will be turning colors.

Montana BMW Riders Safety Course Incentive Program (SCIP) Calendar Year 2023

The purpose of the Safety Course Incentive Program (SCIP) is to encourage safe and responsible riding habits by partially underwriting continuing motorcycle skill education taken by members of the Montana BMW Riders Motorcycle Club.

- 1. During calendar year 2023 \$400 is allocated to the SCIP.
- 2. Kevin Huddy is the administrator of the SCIP.
- Up to eight club members can get a maximum of \$50 in a calendar year to reimburse the cost of taking an <u>approved</u> motorcycle safety course.
- To qualify the rider must be a member in good-standing (dues paid) of the Montana BMW Riders as of 1 April 2023, as well as at the time the course is taken. Kevin will coordinate with the Secretary/Treasurer to confirm an applicant's membership status.
- Courses offered by the Motorcycle Safety Foundation (https://motorcycle.msun.edu), Lee Parks Total Control, RawHyde Adventures or courses created by the BMW Motorrad Performance Center are approved.
- Members <u>must</u> request approval by Kevin of courses other than those listed in line 5.
 To gain approval, the course must include instruction on, and practical application of riding skills and knowledge designed to enhance rider safety; and may have either an on-road or off-road focus. Track days do not qualify.
- If more than eight members qualify for reimbursement, then the club leadership will consider increasing the funding allocation to cover the additional applicants. The final decision on a funding increase will be based primarily on the availability of additional discretionary funds in the club's budget.
- Money will be allocated based on when a completed request for reimbursement is received by Kevin; first come, first paid.
- 9. Only one course per member is reimbursable in a calendar year.
- 10. Requests for reimbursement can be made after the completion of an approved safety course, but must be received prior to October 1, 2023. Payments will be made in October once all applications are in.
- 11. Submit requests for reimbursement to Kevin (huddykl@gmail.com); requests must include proof of successful completion of the course. Proof can be in the form of a legible copy, scan or photograph of the original document.
- 12. Kevin Huddy will coordinate with the club Treasurer, to arrange payment.

"I really enjoy this part of Nevada. Lots of open space, neat mountain ranges, and the sago is in bloom. Smells great."


